Christ is risen, alleluia! He is risen indeed, alleluia!

Easter blessings to all of you! Whether you were able to worship with us in Malmo or spent the day elsewhere, I hope you had a wonderful day!

As we all have realized by now, this year Easter falls on April Fools' Day – a coincidence that no doubt worked its way into many pastors' sermons. Given Easter's status as the most important of all Christian holidays, perhaps this quirk of the calendar seemed a bit frivolous at best, and downright sacrilegious at worst. How can a holiday based around jokes and pranks ever compare with Jesus' death and resurrection and the salvation of the world?

Yet Easter is first and foremost a joyous occasion! Both Easter day and the season that follows highlights God's great act of love given to us in Jesus' life, death, and resurrection and how that love changes the world. How could we do anything but smile on such a day?

But I think the connections might run even deeper. Our faith is meant to be transformative, and humor can be an important tool in inspiring change. Humor, at its best, tells a truth. More than just a vehicle for insults and innuendo, humor has the ability to reveal something about what it means to be a human being.

Even if we think back on the humor of our childhood, that brand of humor that is so often focused on bodily functions of one kind or another, even that kind of humor tells a truth. For a kid, as much as the enjoyment of that humor comes from watching our parents squirm, it also provides some comfort, some measure of catharsis. Kid's own bodies can be incredibly stress-inducing. Not that it entirely goes away as we get older, but the human body rapidly goes through all kinds of drastic changes in our youth. Humor found in burps and farts helps kids bring that stress to light and helps them to realize that they are not alone in their fears. We all deal with these "gross" and embarrassing realities, even though most adults learn to keep it to themselves as much as possible in polite company.

More adult kinds of humor work similarly – whether the joke concerns relationships or politics or matters of life and death, humor helps us see reality more clearly. It can poke fun at our fears, it can mock the powerful and those who might be a source of our stress, but it also connects

us to other people. Humor fights that tendency to hide our fears and put on a brave face. Humor deflates our ego and keeps us from pretending that our... well, you know what, doesn't stink. Humor, when misused, can be hypocritical and cruel, but the best humor delights in bringing our shortcomings into the light of day, so that it can say something true about what it means to be a human being. It is a great comfort to learn that we are not alone in even our most spectacular and creative screw-ups.

Communities of faith, at our best, are places of truth telling. In our churches, we learn about our God and we go out and share with others the truth about what kind of Creator we have that gave and continues to give us life. We also come to learn about ourselves and our place in God's world, and what that means for our relationship with God. We come to be honest about ourselves, finally and fully. We try to bring our fears and our shortcomings into the light, not to just dismiss them in an easy hand-wave, but to deal with them,

We tell truth about the unpleasant so that it no longer has a hold over us. Confess it before God and neighbor so that the fears, the nervousness, and our own guilt and shame no longer controls us. If good humor provides a taste of that freedom, so does good faith – combined with the Easter gift of Jesus Christ, good faith does that a thousand times over.

Jesus frees us from sin, knowing that we will still probably struggle with doing things we shouldn't and not doing things we should, but also knowing that, freed from having to win God's love, we will be free to more fully love God and all that God has created – ourselves, our neighbors, and our world.

So, don't be afraid to enjoy both Easter and April Fools – as the Psalmist sings: "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth." The psalmist may have had singing and horns and lyres and clapping hands in mind, but probably wouldn't begrudge a good, hearty laugh.

Update on the upcoming Choir Season. We will be starting Choir Practice on April 4th at 6:00 pm, and will be singing "Jesus Messiah" on Sunday, April 15th. What is an RMD?

Once you hit age 70½, the IRS requires you to start withdrawing from—and paying taxes on—most types of tax-advantaged retirement accounts. You will also need to take RMDs from any retirement accounts you inherit. In most cases, RMDs are treated as ordinary income for tax purposes.

Can I donate my RMD to charity and avoid the taxes?

YES. These "qualified charitable distributions" (QCDs) will not be added to your taxable income for the year. *They must go directly to a charity* designated as qualified by the IRS. Making QCDs can be a great strategy for anyone who is charitably minded and does not need his or her full RMD. In many cases, it is more advantageous than taking the withdrawal and then donating it, because cash donations have deductibility limits. (Information taken from the website:

Making a QCD as opposed to a normal charitable gift has two main advantages. First, a QCD counts toward satisfying the individual's required minimum distribution for that year. Second, the distribution is excluded from the taxpayer's income. (Information taken from the website:

Is Bethesda Lutheran Church a QCD?

YES! A charity must be a 501(c)(3) organization in order to receive tax-free IRA charitable contributions. Bethesda is a 501(c)(3) organization.


