Introduction

The readings and psalm are the same this Sunday every year: Christ emptying himself of divine power and protection, willingly becoming vulnerable to those who struck him and put him to death. With Christ we lament his suffering and all human suffering, but expect God's final vindication. Mark's passion story begins with an unnamed woman anointing his head, perhaps to proclaim him Messiah, and Jesus saying she has anointed him beforehand for burial. Mark's Easter story will begin with women going to anoint Jesus for burial, only to find that he has been raised, God's living Anointed One.

PROCESSIONAL GOSPEL: Mark 11:1-11

An assisting minister or the presiding minister reads the processional gospel.

The holy gospel according to Mark.

Glory to you, O Lord.

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, [Jesus] sent two of his disciples ² and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. ³If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.' " ⁴They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, 5 some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" ⁶They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. ⁷Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! ¹⁰Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" ¹¹Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

PSALM: Psalm 31:9-16

Into your hands, O LORD, I commend my spirit. (Ps. 31:5)

⁹Have mercy on me, O LORD, for I am in trouble; my eye is consumed with sorrow, and also my throat and my belly.

¹⁰For my life is wasted with grief, and my years with sighing; my strength fails me because of affliction, and my bones are consumed.

¹¹I am the scorn of my enemies, a disgrace to my neighbors, a dismay to my acquaintances; when they see me in the street they avoid me.

¹²Like the dead I am forgotten, out of mind; I am as useless as a broken pot.

¹³For I have heard the whispering of the crowd; fear is all around; they put their heads together against me; they plot to take my life.

¹⁴But as for me, I have trusted in you, O LORD. I have said, "You are my God.

¹⁵My times are in your hand; rescue me from the hand of my enemies, and from those who persecute me.

¹⁶Let your face shine upon your servant; save me in your steadfast love."

READING: Philippians 2:5-11

Christ did not act to attain status and glory but was obedient to God even to the point of death. Following Christ's example, we do not seek personal status or glory but care for others as God cared for us in Christ's death.

⁵Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, ⁶who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, ⁷but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, ⁸he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross.

⁹Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

GOSPEL:

The Holy Gospel, according to Saint Mark, the 14th and 15th chapters Glory to you, O Lord

Narrator: It was two days before Passover and the Festival of Unleavened Bread.

The chief priests and legal experts through cunning tricks were

searching for a way to arrest Jesus and kill him. But they agreed that it shouldn't happen during the festival; otherwise, there would be an uproar among the people.

Jesus was at Bethany visiting the house of Simon, who had a skin disease. During dinner, a woman came in with a vase made of alabaster and containing very expensive perfume of pure nard. She broke open the vase and poured the perfume on his head. Some grew angry. They said to each other:

The people: "Why waste the perfume? This perfume could have been sold for almost a year's pay and the money given to the poor."

Narrator: And they scolded her. Jesus said,

Jesus: "Leave her alone. Why do you make trouble for her? She has done a good thing for me. You always have the poor with you; and whenever you want, you can do something good for them. But you won't always have me. She has done what she could. She has anointed my body ahead of time for burial. I tell you the truth that, wherever in the whole world the good news is announced, what she's done will also be told in

memory of her."

Narrator: Judas Iscariot, one of the Twelve, went to the chief priests to give Jesus up to them. When they heard it, they were delighted and promised to give him money. So he started looking for an opportunity to turn him in. On the first day of the Festival of Unleavened Bread, when the

Passover lamb was sacrificed, the disciples said to Jesus,

The people: "Where do you want us to prepare for you to eat the Passover meal?"

Narrator: He sent two of his disciples and said to them,

Jesus: "Go into the city. A man carrying a water jar will meet you. Follow him.

Wherever he enters, say to the owner of the house, 'The teacher asks, "Where is my guest room where I can eat the Passover meal with my disciples?" 'He will show you a large room upstairs already furnished.

Prepare for us there."

Narrator: The disciples left, came into the city, found everything just as he had

told them, and they prepared the Passover meal. That evening, Jesus

arrived with the Twelve. During the meal, Jesus said,

Jesus: "I assure you that one of you will betray me—someone eating with

me."

Narrator: Deeply saddened, they asked him, one by one,

The people: "It's not me, is it?"

Narrator: Jesus answered,

Jesus: "It's one of the Twelve, one who is dipping bread with me into this

bowl. The Son of Man goes to his death just as it is written about him. But how terrible it is for that person who betrays the Son of Man! It

would have been better for him if he had never been born."

Narrator: While they were eating, Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave

it to them, and said,

Jesus: "Take; this is my body."

Narrator: He took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank

from it. He said to them,

Jesus: "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. I

assure you that I won't drink wine again until that day when I drink it in

a new way in God's kingdom."

Narrator: After singing songs of praise, they went out to the Mount of Olives.

Jesus said to them,

Jesus: "You will all falter in your faithfulness to me. It is written, I will hit the

shepherd, and the sheep will go off in all directions.²⁸ But after I'm raised

up, I will go before you to Galilee."

Narrator: Peter said to him,

The people: "Even if everyone else stumbles, I won't."

Narrator: But Jesus said to him,

Jesus: "I assure you that on this very night, before the rooster crows twice,

you will deny me three times."

Narrator: But Peter insisted,

The people: "If I must die alongside you, I won't deny you."

Narrator: And they all said the same thing. Jesus and his disciples came to a

place called Gethsemane. Jesus said to them,

Jesus: "Sit here while I pray."

Narrator: He took Peter, James, and John along with him. He began to feel

despair and was anxious. He said to them,

Jesus: "My soul is deeply grieved, even to the point of death. Stay here and

keep alert."

Narrator: Then he went a short distance farther and fell to the ground. He prayed

that, if possible, he might be spared the time of suffering. He said,

Jesus: "Abba, Father, for you all things are possible. Take this cup of suffering

away from me. However—not what I want but what you want."

Narrator: Then he came and found them sleeping. He said to Peter,

Jesus: "Simon, are you asleep? Couldn't you stay alert for one hour? Stay

alert and pray so that you won't give in to temptation. The spirit is

eager, but the flesh is weak."

Narrator: Again, he left them and prayed,

repeating the same words. And, again, when he came back, he found them sleeping, for they couldn't keep their eyes open...

The people: (silence)

Narrator: ...and they didn't know how to respond to him. He came a third time

and said to them,

Jesus: "Will you sleep and rest all night? That's enough! The time has come

for the Son of Man to be betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up!

Let's go! Look, here comes my betrayer."

Narrator: Suddenly, while Jesus was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve,

came with a mob carrying swords and clubs. They had been sent by the chief priests, legal experts, and elders. His betrayer had given them

a sign:

The people: "Arrest the man I kiss, and take him away under guard."

Narrator: As soon as he got there, Judas said to Jesus,

The people: "Rabbi!"

Narrator: Then he kissed him. Then they came and grabbed Jesus and arrested

him. One of the bystanders drew a sword and struck the high priest's

slave and cut off his ear. Jesus responded,

Jesus: "Have you come with swords and clubs to arrest me, like an outlaw?

Day after day, I was with you, teaching in the temple, but you didn't

arrest me. But let the scriptures be fulfilled."

Narrator: And all his disciples left him and ran away. One young man, a disciple,

was wearing nothing but a linen cloth. They grabbed him, but he left the linen cloth behind and ran away naked. They led Jesus away to the high priest, and all the chief priests, elders, and legal experts gathered.

Peter followed him from a distance, right into the high priest's

courtyard. He was sitting with the guards, warming himself by the fire. The chief priests and the whole Sanhedrin were looking for testimony against Jesus in order to put him to death, but they couldn't find any. Many brought false testimony against him, but they contradicted each

other. Some stood to offer false witness against him, saying,

The people: "We heard him saying, 'I will destroy this temple,

constructed by humans, and within three days I will build

another, one not made by humans."

Narrator: But their testimonies didn't agree even on this point. Then the high

priest stood up in the middle of the gathering and examined Jesus.

The people: "Aren't you going to respond to the testimony these

people have brought against you?"

Narrator: But Jesus was silent and didn't answer. Again, the high priest asked,

The people: "Are you the Christ, the Son of the blessed one?"

Narrator: Jesus said,

Jesus: "I am. And you will see the Son of Man sitting on the right side of the

Almighty and coming on the heavenly clouds."

Narrator: Then the high priest tore his clothes and said,

The people: "Why do we need any more witnesses? You've heard his

insult against God. What do you think?"

Narrator: They all condemned him.

The people: "He deserves to die!"

Narrator: Some began to spit on him. Some covered his face and hit him, saying,

The people: "Prophesy!"

Narrator: Then the guards took him and beat him.

Meanwhile, Peter was below in the courtyard. A woman, one of the high priest's servants, approached and saw Peter warming himself by

the fire. She stared at him and said,

The people: "You were also with the Nazarene, Jesus."

Narrator: But he denied it, saying,

The people: "I don't even understand what you're talking about!"

Narrator: And he went outside into the outer courtyard. A rooster crowed.

The female servant saw him and began a second time to say to those

standing around,

The people: "This man is one of them."

Narrator: But he denied it again. A short time later, those standing around again

said to Peter,

The people: "You must be one of them, because you are also a

Galilean."

Narrator: But he cursed and swore,

The people: "I don't know this man you're talking about."

Narrator: At daybreak, the chief priests—with the elders, legal experts, and the

whole Sanhedrin—formed a plan. They bound Jesus, led him away, and

turned him over to Pilate. Pilate questioned him,

The people: "Are you the king of the Jews?"

Narrator: Jesus replied,

Jesus: "That's what you say."

Narrator: The chief priests were accusing him of many things. Pilate asked him

again,

The people: "Aren't you going to answer? What about all these accusations?"

Narrator: But Jesus gave no more answers, so that Pilate marveled. During the

festival, Pilate released one prisoner to them, whomever they

requested. A man named Barabbas was locked up with the rebels who had committed murder during an uprising. The crowd pushed forward

and asked Pilate to release someone, as he regularly did. Pilate

answered them,

The people: "Do you want me to release to you the king of the Jews?"

Narrator: He knew that the chief priests had handed him over because of

jealousy. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release

Barabbas to them instead. Pilate replied,

The people: "Then what do you want me to do with the one you call

king of the Jews?"

Narrator: They shouted back,

The people: "Crucify him!"

Narrator: Pilate said to them,

The people: "Why? What wrong has he done?"

Narrator: They shouted even louder,

The people: "Crucify him!"

Narrator: Pilate wanted to satisfy the crowd, so he

released Barabbas to them. He had Jesus whipped, then handed him over to be

crucified. The soldiers led Jesus away into the

courtyard of the palace known as the governor's headquarters, and they called

together the whole company of soldiers. They

dressed him up in a purple robe and twisted together a crown of

thorns and put it on him. They saluted him,

The people: "Hey! King of the Jews!"

Narrator: Again and again, they struck his head with a stick. They spit on him and

knelt before him to honor him. When they finished mocking him, they stripped him of the purple robe and put his own clothes back on him.

Then they led him out to crucify him. Simon, a man from Cyrene,

Alexander and Rufus' father, was coming in from the countryside. They forced him to carry his cross. They brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha, which means Place of the Skull. They tried to give him wine

mixed with myrrh, but he didn't take it.

They crucified him. They divided up his clothes, drawing lots for them to determine who would take what. It was nine in the morning when they crucified him. The notice of the formal charge against him was written, "The king of the Jews." They crucified two outlaws with him, one on his right and one on his left.

People walking by insulted him, shaking their heads and saying,

The people: "Ha! So you were going to destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, were you? Save yourself and come down from that cross!"

Narrator: In the same way, the chief priests were making fun of him among themselves, together with the legal experts.

The people: "He saved others, but he can't save himself. Let the Christ, the king of Israel, come down from the cross. Then we'll see and believe."

Narrator: Even those who had been crucified with Jesus insulted him. From noon until three in the afternoon the whole earth was dark. At three, Jesus cried out with a loud shout,

Jesus: "Eloi, eloi, lama sabachthani,"

Narrator: which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" After hearing him, some standing there said,

The people: "Look! He's calling Elijah!"

Narrator: Someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, and put it on a pole. He offered it to Jesus to drink, saying,

The people: "Let's see if Elijah will come to take him down."

Narrator: But Jesus let out a loud cry and died. The curtain of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom.

When the centurion, who stood facing Jesus, saw how he died, he said,


The people: "This man was certainly God's Son."

Narrator: Some women were watching from a distance, including Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James (the younger one) and Joses, and Salome. When Jesus was in Galilee, these women had followed and supported him, along with many other women who had come to Jerusalem with him. Since it was late in the afternoon on

Preparation Day, just before the Sabbath, Joseph from Arimathea dared to approach Pilate and ask for Jesus' body. (Joseph was a prominent council member who also eagerly anticipated the coming of God's kingdom.) Pilate wondered if Jesus was already dead. He called

the centurion and asked him whether
Jesus had already died. When he learned
from the centurion that Jesus was dead,
Pilate gave the dead body to Joseph.

Joseph bought a linen cloth, took Jesus down from the cross, wrapped him in the cloth, and laid him in a tomb that had been carved out of rock. He rolled a stone against the entrance to the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where he was buried.
