Greetings, sisters and brothers in Christ! Though it is a bit cloudy and gray as I write this letter, we have already been blessed with several beautiful early summer days. It is that

wonderful time of year in Minnesota when the sun shines bright, but the humidity and bugs have not yet come in full force. We also welcome all the new life springing up around us, as our world also gets a bit greener. Not to mention the metaphorical new life as more and more people head up to the lake to enjoy the great outdoors.

Personally, I am looking forward to experiencing my first summer here at Bethesda. My calendar is already getting quite packed with all kinds of summer activities that we either host or participate in as a congregation. I am also enjoying the chance to connect and re-connect with people I either met briefly or had already gone to warmer climates when I started late last fall. If I have a bit of a confused look on my face as I try to remember your name on Sunday, my apologies, but please feel free to (re)introduce yourself to me!

In last month's letter I mentioned that we are going be making communion part of our worship service every Sunday, but I also hinted at another worship experiment we will be trying this summer, something called the "Narrative Lectionary." I do understand, however, if there is something about the word "lectionary" that just makes you yawn – trust me, it should be fun!

A lectionary is basically a schedule of scripture readings that a church can use. Our current lectionary is the Revised Common Lectionary (or RCL), created by an ecumenical council of churches and released in 1994 and based on the previous Common Lectionary, itself based on the lectionary used by the Roman Catholic Church. The RCL is used by most of the mainline Protestant Church in several different countries.

The RCL uses a three-year cycle that rotates among several different Old and New Testament readings and cycles between Matthew, Mark, and Luke, with John filling in around Christmas and Easter and other festival Sundays.

The newer Narrative Lectionary began around 2010 by Rolf Jacobson and Craig Koester, two professors at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, my alma mater, and has been growing in popularity. It works a little differently – rather than having up to 4 Bible readings on a Sunday (Old Testament, Psalm, New Testament, Gospel), it focuses on one main Bible passage. An optional suggested reading can be added, but the idea is that beginning in September a church will begin in the book of Genesis and work its way through the Bible by the following June. Various 4-6 week long summer series can be used during the summer months.

The Narrative Lectionary website explains the basic flow:

- From September to mid-December the preaching texts begin with the early chapters of Genesis, move through the stories of Israel's early history, the exodus, the kings, prophets, exile and return.
- From Christmas to Easter there is sustained reading of one of the four gospels
- From Easter to Pentecost the texts are chosen from Acts and Paul's letters.

The website notes that "the texts include the major episodes in Scripture. They are arranged in a narrative sequence to help people see Scripture as a story that has coherence and a dynamic movement." Also, by having fewer readings, the main reading can cover more of a Bible story, capturing more of the train of thought. The Narrative lectionary also works on a 4-year cycle, so John can get have his own year, and Mark doesn't get John and Luke filling in his supposed gaps.

This summer we are going to experiment with 4 of the recommended summer series. It should help us get a taste for having more interconnected readings. We will first work our way through the 10 Commandments, then cover the New Testament letter of 1 John, then the Old Testament book of Ruth, and finally a short three-week series on Stewardship and Generosity at the end of August. It won't be quite the same as the much longer full lectionary year, but hopefully we will be able to get a good enough sense if this feels right for our congregation.

Because, of course, no lectionary is perfect. They are just one of the many tools we use to help us hear the word of God better. We are a church (speaking as Bethesda and Lutherans as a whole) that believes in freedom in worship. We may tend to be more structured than our evangelical brothers and sisters, but at our heart we believe that what is most important is whatever communicates the life-giving word of God in the most powerful way. All the rest is up to each community of faith to decide. That is why we push ourselves to have these little experiments, to try new things, to feature both old favorites backed by organ and new songs backed by drums, guitar and piano. God's promises of love may be eternal and unchangeable, but our ears tend to be a bit fickle and selective, like teenagers tuning out all that good advice that mom and dad try to impart.

So, it's good to mix things up now and then. Read different readings. Pray different prayers. Sing new songs. We don't want to mix things up so much that people are constantly dazed and confused as they leave every Sunday morning, but neither should worship be a time where you can just cruise along on autopilot to kill an hour or so before brunch. The Holy Spirit invites us into a life filled with more challenges and excitement than that.

So, I hope this summer will be for you a lively and lovely time. Restful and reflective moments are good too, and cool summer mornings and summer evenings provide many great opportunities to take it easy, but a healthy life needs a balance of both. In any case, however you spend your time, try and share that time with friends old and new. Yours in Christ, Pastor James Muske

<u>In attendance:</u> Mary Braun, Melody Lackner, Jenny Schuett, Ron Mehlhop, Kathy Berland, Ron Haglund, Pastor James Muske and George Smith. The meeting was called to order by council president Ron Mehlhop.

Pastor James gave opening Devotions.

Secretary's Report:

Motion was made to accept the minutes of the April meeting by Mary Braun, seconded by Jenny Schuett, and passed.

Treasurer's Report:

Financial view and current month activity for April was presented by Mary Braun. She will continue to work with Mary and Mark Vukelich on transparency of parsonage fund reporting. Motion was made by Kathy Berland to accept the treasurer's report, seconded by Melody Lackner and passed.

Pastor's Report: April to May 18, 2018

During the first part of this month I was away on a week of vacation to Iceland! Many thanks to all who helped keep things going in my absence, especially to George for filling in on worship leadership and preaching duties. While the trip wasn't exactly restful, I had a great time nonetheless.

Thanks also to Val for taking over the pulpit while I was away at the Synod Assembly this month. The assembly went well, no big debates or drama, but it was good to get to meet more of our neighboring churches and their pastors and people and get a better sense of the entire ministry that is going on in our corner of Minnesota. Next year's Synod Assembly will be held in Duluth, May 3-5.

Other major items from this month include continue to work with the Worship and Music committee about upgrading some of our technology in the sanctuary. Randy and I met with Jodi this week to talk through some projection options that could improve both quality and usability. Worship-wise, I have also been working to introduce the new Narrative Lectionary summer series readings. Finding good matching hymns has been a bit of a challenge for the first series – The Ten Commandments, but luckily we have all those hymn suggestions people have submitted to help fill the gaps a bit. I also had fun filling in for George on the drums for this month's praise band Sunday, but am happy that he is well and taking the sticks back. One of the other main items has been working with our Confirmation students in anticipation of Confirmation/Pentecost Sunday this weekend. Both Ellee and Emilie have my full endorsement, as they have been great to work with this past months. I wish I had started a year earlier, so I could have been there for the whole process with them.

Instead of writing the more traditional faith statements, I have had them apply some of those faith questions to developing a more practical project idea. The idea they chose was a church garden – raising herbs and vegetables that could be donated to the Veggie Stand. The important part for me was the thought process, but they also seem interested in actually making it happen. After seeking some additional adult helpers, I would recommend council consider their proposal and request for funds.

With time off for vacation and attending the Synod Assembly, I was only able to visit a few folks this month, but spoke with Carolyn Morris about regularly touching base with her and a couple others about making sure all those who could use a visit receive one.

Old Business:

Future Expenses for Parsonage (ex: landscaping): Ron Mehlhop gave an update on landscaping for the parsonage (see property committee report below). Based on his report, Ron Haglund made a motion to accept the R&R landscaping bid for the parsonage landscaping of \$7,720. Mary seconded the motion and it passed. Mary Braun then made a motion that the landscaping bid is paid through liabilities on account #280 (facility property fund). Seconded by Ron and passed.

Pilot the "Narrative Lectionary" this summer (W&M) — Pastor is looking for hymns to match the series. Mary had questions about the printing the bulletin using the correct readings and prayers of the day and will work with Pastor.

New Business:

Review new Scholarship Form and procedures: The Scholarship Application form was updated by the

Stewardship committee and brought to council. The council reviewed it and a motion was made that it should include part-time students also. Mary will take back to Stewardship to revise.

New members: Suggest having a quarterly schedule for accepting new members. Pastor James will do this. They will plan one soon.

Recycling: Ron Haglund brought up that we need to be sorting the recycling and that it is for church recyclables only. There is a recycling bin for plastics in the kitchen. There was a concern also about where the cardboard goes. Ron M. will bring to the property committee's attention.

Council discussed the recommended and required constitution updates. George will go through it more carefully and bring it to the council for a motion to accept next month.

2018-19 Budget worksheets for every committee are due no later than June 15th.

2. **Advertising:** Judie Birk has designed and ordered 2 flag style signs to help advertise the veggie stand. Judie applied for Thrivent dollars to cover most of the cost. There will be tee shirts for veggie stand workers provided by Thrivent.

Sue and Judie will update the post card advertising Bethesda's events to be handed out at

veggie stand, Malmo Event, 4th of July, and any place appropriate.

We looked over a flier from a church in Arizona and will consider getting that updated as a mailer or additional advertisement.

3. **New Directory:** Lifetouch will be here Aug 15-18 to take photos for a new directory. Sandy Pullen is keeping in touch with Lifetouch as they are asking for volunteers to be available for training 6-8 weeks before photo dates.

4. Vacation Bible School: The dates are June 18-22, 2018. Registrations have been mailed out to those who have attended in previous years and to grandparents who may have children that age. Rather than order a Kid-to-Kid project, the Tofteland's have been asked to teach the children about the Lutheran Global Ministry Project. The music CD's are available for those interested in having the music ahead of time. The students will help pack some Operation Christmas Shoe Boxes again this year. We will have meetings and call for volunteers as needed. It is the BEST week of summer!!

5. **Confirmation:** Ellie Johnson and Emilie Vukelich will be confirmed May 20, 2018. They were each given a Bible last fall. We will have flowers, a cross necklace, and cake that Sunday. The Committee was informed that the council approved changing to communion every Sunday and the recommendation to pilot the Narrative Lectionary over the summer. The Committee decided that both every Sunday Communion and the Narrative Lectionary would begin on Sunday May 27th. Randy will update Dianne Jones and Skip Hanson of this start date. The committee also decided to not have lectors during the piloting of the Narrative Lectionary and Pastor James will do the associated readings. The committee was also informed the Church Council approved the committee's recommendation to begin researching new technology for the sanctuary that would easier allow video and other multimedia. Randy will work with Pastor James in researching equipment and then the committee will decide if it wants to make a recommendation to purchase to the Council.

New Business:

- The committee was informed that the synod prefers that communion be served only when an ordained Pastor is in attendance. The committee discussed our practice of using local members for pulpit vacancy when our Pastor is gone and how we would handle that with the church now moving to communion every Sunday. It was decided that we will not serve communion on the Sundays that a church parishioner leads the service
- A follow up discussion from last month's meeting regarding multicultural music was held. It was decided that this is something that the Praise Choir would occasionally do and if there is further interest from the congregation it could be occasionally added to other services
- A follow up discussion from last month's meeting regarding singing the liturgy was held. It was decided that Pastor James will select a sung liturgy he would like to try and then he will work with Jim Christensen to implement

- A follow up discussion from last month's meeting regarding plans for a summer midweek or Saturday evening service was held. It was agreed we would not hold a scheduled mid-week or Saturday evening service this year. But, Pastor James intends to attend other services in the area this summer to research what type of summer ministry Bethesda may have in the future
- It was agreed that the committee would do a congregational survey in early August. Carol Bakken and Jim Christensen agreed to lead the survey process. It was agreed the survey will include questions regarding worship music, the Narrative Lectionary and the singing of the liturgy
- Jim Christensen shared with the committee that he had been in touch with Dakota Road in regard to a summer concert. The committee informed Jim that it was interested in pursuing this if the price was the same as last year and if it would be held as a fundraiser and focused on community involvement. Jim agreed to follow up with Dakota Road to check availability for the weekend before or after July 4th

The Family Table

One of Theodore Roosevelt's sons told someone how much he appreciated the family he had been a part of as a child. He commented that he had gone to Groton, a private school, then on to Harvard and short terms in other schools. Yet he felt that the best education he had ever received was at the family table.
