## From the Pastor

*“Do not judge, so that you may not be judged. For with the judgment you make you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get. Why do you see the speck in your neighbor’s eye, but do*

*not notice the log in your own eye? Or how can you say to your neighbor, ‘Let me take the speck out of your eye,’ while the log is in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbor’s eye.”*  
(Matthew 7:1-5)

Greetings, fellow brothers and sisters in Christ! Listening, as I noted last month, is a vital part of our Christian calling and service. It is a pretty handy practice for our role as US citizen too. Freedom of speech is essential for a healthy democracy, but we need good ears for that mouth to work properly. Of course, one wrinkle I failed to mention was that life in the 21<sup>st</sup> century faces ever-growing challenges when it comes to listening - as modern-day people we are so inundated with information that it recalls that saying about drinking water through a fire hose. Between network news, cable tv, print newspapers, radio, Facebook and Twitter and all the rest, information bombards us from every angle.

Early this year my brother and I took a trip to Iceland and we were amazed that even in fairly rural regions of that country they had good cellphone service, enough that we were able to stream some music and podcasts as we drove around, the Icelandic radio stations being a bit lost on us. I did read recently, however, that some locals in one remote peninsula on the NW corner of Iceland is trying to preserve a “digital free zone.” One small corner of an otherwise tech friendly island that is free from ringing and beeping and buzzing smartphones. The need for emergency services might encourage them to plop down some more cell towers, but it is easy to see the appeal in silence.

But for those of us who feel compelled to stay informed (even when the news regularly makes us depressed), sorting news you can trust from that firehose blast of information can be a daunting task. Yet it is a necessary step, because as much as modern technology has made communicating easier that means it is also easier for people to communicate bad information. Sometimes I feel like the Amish had the right idea all along.

Recently, the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions created a handy graphic to help sort good news from bad. Here is their advice for considering which online news stories to share (but could be adapted for news more generally):

- **Consider the source:** Click away from the story to investigate the site, its mission and its contact info.
- **Read beyond:** Headlines can be outrageous in an effort to get clicks. What’s the whole story?
- **Check the author:** Do a quick search on the author. Are they credible? Are they real?
- **Supporting sources?** Click on those links. Determine if the info given actually supports the story.
- **Check the date:** Reposting old news stories doesn’t mean they’re relevant to current events.
- **Is it a joke?** If it is too outlandish, it might be satire. Research the site and author to be sure.
- **Check your biases:** Consider if your own beliefs could affect your judgement.
- **Ask the experts:** Ask a librarian, or consult a fact-checking site.

This may all seem like a lot of work, but if we are going to ignore Jesus’ advice and post something that makes a judgement call on other people, we want to at least make sure we know what we are talking about.

It is very easy these days to share something with your closest 324 friends on social media, but we don’t always take responsibility for our incredible new power. It used to be that you would only embarrass yourself in front of your family at Thanksgiving or down at the local bar or breakfast spot when you spouted off about something. Now, if you see that speck in someone else’s eye, you can make sure everybody knows.

And once everyone is talking and texting and posting to social media about that speck, it kind of short-circuits our brain and we begin to see that speck magnified to log-sized and beyond. Whether the information is outright false or has an element of truth, but doesn’t tell the whole story, the more bad information spreads, the harder it is to shake.

Jesus may not have had a smartphone, but he knew the danger of judging too quickly, of bearing false witness, and of speaking more than listening. There are times that we do need to speak out, but when we do, we need to do our homework. Otherwise, maybe just do what I do and stick to posting photos of your pets on Facebook, it just seems safer.

## **NEW COMMITTEE FORMED**

A new committee named the Mutual Ministry Committee has just been approved by the Church Council. Its purpose is to support a healthy relationship between our pastor and the congregation and provide a safe confidential forum to gather, clarify and share feedback and concerns within the congregation and our pastor.

The launch of the Mutual Ministry Committee comes after several years of discussion and planning and was a recommendation of both Pastor Jim Raisanen and Pastor Terry Frovik as something that would be beneficial for Bethesda. Additionally, Mutual Ministry Committees are now common throughout ELCA churches and have been found to be very helpful in building long term healthy relationships between the pastor and the congregation.

A complete description of Bethesda's Mutual Ministry Committee is included in this month's Life-Line Newsletter so you can more fully understand its purpose and responsibilities. But it's also important to understand what the committee is not. The committee is not intended to eliminate direct communication with the pastor. All members of Bethesda are encouraged to speak directly with our pastor and share any feedback they feel comfortable expressing. But the committee will serve to find ways to gather feedback both formally and informally that is intended to make our pastor as personally and professionally successful as they can be and to create a healthy relationship between the pastor and congregation.

In addition to Pastor James, members of the newly formed committee include Carolyn Morris, Char Berg and is chaired by Randy Tofteland. The committee will soon be communicating plans on how it will gather congregation feedback and input, but in the meantime if you have anything on your minds that you would like the committee to hear and know please seek out Carolyn, Char or Randy and they will ensure your input and feedback is handled in a sensitive and confidential manner.

## **MUTUAL MINISTRY COMMITTEE**

**Job Description (October 2018)**

### **PURPOSE**

The primary function of the Mutual Ministry Committee is to support a healthy relationship between the pastor and the congregation. It provides a forum of mutual trust and is a "Listening Post" and "Sounding Board" for both pastor and congregation.

### **DUTIES / RESPONSIBILITIES**

1. Provide a safe and confidential forum to gather, clarify and share feedback and concerns within congregation and the pastor.
2. Develop open communication about the expectations, attitudes and concerns within the congregation and pastor.
3. Identify early warning signs of misunderstandings.
4. Serve as a group where the pastor can test new ideas.
5. Be a sounding board in time of personal and professional stress for the pastor.
6. Provide frequent and on-going informal feedback to the pastor with the sole intention of improving personal and professional effectiveness.
7. Serves as the exit interview group when a pastor leaves the congregation.

### **CHAIRPERSON / MEMBER**

#### **QUALIFICATIONS**

1. Actively engaged within the congregation and committed to Christ.
2. Trustworthy, open minded and willing to listen.
3. Committed to and capable of keeping information Strictly Confidential.
4. Possess and display a true concern for others and have a strong sense of empathy.
5. Willingness to share sometimes difficult information or concern in a caring, sensitive manner.

### **MEMBER SIZE / TERM**

1. Initially no more than 4 members (including pastor).
2. Each member (excluding pastor) will serve a two year term with a maximum of two consecutive terms.

#### **Items needed/wanted for Isle School's Food Pantry**

1. Canned chicken, tuna and ham or hearty, ready-to-go meals like beef stew and chili with meat. Non-perishable items rich in protein are the most desired food drive donation items.
2. Canned vegetables: Potatoes, beans, carrots, spinach or peas, all with no salt added preferred – THAT KIDS WOULD LIKE...
3. Canned fruit ...plus individual fruit cups
4. Canned tomatoes & pasta sauces
5. Shelf stable milk and alternatives (rice, soy, etc.)
6. Snack items for kids to take to school: juice boxes, applesauce containers, granola bars
7. Single serve macaroni & cheese, microwavable foods, bowls, packets
8. Cereal cups
9. Nuts – sealed to take out of the building
10. Peanut or other nut butter, especially crunchy-sealed to take out of the building
11. Instant oatmeal, instant grits
12. Whole grain pasta, brown rice and quinoa
13. Biscuit or baking mixes (that only require water)
14. Spices like cinnamon, oregano, basil, salt, pepper
15. Items that have a long shelf life but always goes immediately-some breads-crackers-cookies
16. Bags of apples or potatoes.
17. Chocolate. It's not a necessity but just a pick-me-up that helps lift the heart of some

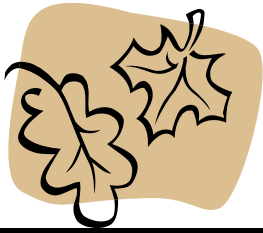
