From the Pastor

Happy New Year, sisters and brothers in Christ!

Though some of you need little encouragement to be joyful, as you are likely reading this from some

warmer, southern climate. As much as the time between Thanksgiving and New Year is a time of traveling for many, we are one of those congregations that sees a mass exodus this time of year. Caravans of Bethesda folks migrating south to Florida and Arizona.

I realize this is mostly due to Minnesota's frigid winter climate, but it does fit well with the Christmas story. Mary and Joseph journeying to Bethlehem for a census and then fleeing south to Egypt to escape the cruel and corrupt government of Herod, who sought Jesus' death.

One fun tradition I wish would spread up our way is the celebration of Las Posadas. Found primarily in Mexico and Latin America, and in Hispanic communities in the United States, Las Posadas remembers the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem. Spread over 9 days in December, ending on Christmas Eve, the name itself means "lodging" or "accommodation."

The story is reenacted with two people dressing up as Mary and Joseph, others may dress as angels or shepherds or even the donkey. Various households will serve as potential stops along the way, with the homeowners refusing them entry as there is no room in their "inn", until finally the large procession stops in front of the final house, which allows all to enter. Evidently the processions can get quite large - imagine hosting a party for our entire congregation! Prayers will be offered, songs will be sung, pinatas will be smashed, and abundant food and drink is shared with all.

I was surprised to discover this year that one of the traditional foods at Las Posadas actually has a long-lost relative here in Malmo. Though there seems to be many versions of the fried dessert Buñuelo, one variation popular around Christmas, Buñuelos de Viento (or "wind-fritters"), consist of dipping an iron rosette mold in very light dough and then deep frying it – basically the same as Scandinavian rosettes! I

fully support any tradition that gives us more reasons to consume rosettes.

But I am getting distracted by fried foods. The theme, I suppose, is more important than even the tastiest of treats. Being welcoming to others, whether family and friends or total strangers, is a an essential Christian calling deeply embedded in the Biblical story. Whether we think of it literally or metaphorically, the concept of welcome and hospitality challenges us to be gracious no matter who shows up at our doorstep. No matter where they have been in life. No matter what we might assume about them. No matter if we think they are "worthy" or not of our generosity. Living a welcoming life exemplifies what it means to show forth to the world the incredible love of God.

We are all on journeys, even if some of us are living that out more literally than others. The passage of time leaves little room to avoid change and having to deal with the new and the different. It is human nature for many of us to want to keep it to a minimum, which is why we have the unfortunate tendency to judge those that bring more newness into our lives and bring change that we can't easily control.

But the Bible teaches us something different. Jesus himself represented both something deeply longed for by many and also something deeply feared by those uncomfortable by the change he would bring. God challenges us to offer welcome when something or someone new knocks on our door. Not that all change is good, of course, but new situations and new people provide new opportunities to show forth God's love.

Near the end of Paul's letter to the Romans, he concedes that at a few points in the letter he spoke rather boldly to them, but that he does so out of God's grace, so that the Gentiles might become an acceptable offering to God, sanctified by the Holy Spirit. (Romans 15:16) Those early Christians, some of them from Jewish backgrounds and many not, had plenty of reasons to distrust one another and plenty of reasons to get on each other's nerves. Paul himself persecuted Christians. But he came to count on the hospitality of those whom he had persecuted.

If we try to find reasons to distrust our neighbor, whether they are familiar to us or not, we will find a reason. But traveling through this life works best when we learn to trust one another, at least a little. We still need to keep our hands on the wheel and our eyes on the road, but if we never trusted anyone, we would never get anywhere.

So, whether you are planning to spend the next few months surrounded by sun and sand or frigid winds and fluffy snow, I hope that your New Year finds you surrounded by the love of God, lived out by familiar, friendly faces and new friends in the making.

– I really enjoy being part of the group... though I

will also enjoy the downtime for the next few months too. Thanks so much to Sheila for her leadership! Attended the synod's Middle School Gathering, Nov 23-24 (Sat/Sun). Thanks to Randy for filling in on Sunday. This was a great chance to reconnect with the confirmation students and to go with them to this long-standing fall event in our area.

As previously noted, I will start taking my share of confirmation classes starting Wed, Jan 8. One of their requirements this winter is to help plan and lead a worship service at Faith, Sunday, Feb. 9. My hope is to also get the students to lead a Lenten evening service here, so both churches get to see their faith in action.

We might want to start thinking now if our church would like to participate in the 2021 National Youth Gathering, held in Minneapolis this time, June 29-July 23, 2021. Both Faith and First Lutheran in Aitkin could be good partners for this event. This is my month for communion services at the Aitkin senior living facilities. Led two last week and will be at Aicota and Aitkin Health Services this week. Also led the funeral service for Judy Wozney this month. Was grateful that Carolyn Morris and I were able to visit her down in St. Cloud before she passed.

The Together Here workshops are continuing up in Brainerd. The Monday, December 30 event will feature a conversation with Kevin Kot, a citizen of the Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, who leads a contextual Christian lodge with his wife Carol. Next month, Dr. Marsha Lue will discuss the concept of "implicit bias": what it is, how it impacts our abilities to form meaningful relationships, and its potential impacts on society. All the meetings will be held at Trinity Lutheran Church in Brainerd, 4th Tuesday of the month, 6:30 PM – 8:30 PM.

To remind from last month: Next year there will be an election for a new bishop for NE Minnesota. The synod website has a helpful page covering the timeline and other materials:

Nominations are currently open for bishop candidates. Any ordained pastor in the ELCA may be nominated, but please speak with them first. Then nominations are forwarded to our conference dean (Rev. Mike Pancoast). Public notification of nominees should be posted by February 1.

On Feb. 9, 2020, all the conferences will host meetings where each will get the chance to select candidates to bring to the Synod Assembly. Pastor and voting members will attend this meeting. Afterwards, nominated candidates are invited to 3 public candidates forums: Calvary Lutheran in Mora on 3/12 at 7pm, St. Andrew's in Grand Rapids on 3/13 at 7pm, Grace in Hermantown on 3/14 at 2pm. The Bishop Election Committee (which I am a member of) has developed a helpful conversation guide for congregations. We should find a time to host one at Bethesda, but should also explore an online option for our winter travelers.

Old Business:

A Certificate of Insurance from the Helicopter transport company's Insurance showing the church as an additional insured on their policy has been requested. I am waiting for their response.

Meeting scheduled with Edward Jones in Aitkin (Mark Baloun) turned out to be a no-show. They have not contacted Mary to schedule another meeting. Suggest visiting with Thrivent. Multimedia information update for the congregation still on schedule for December 22nd Scholarship Committee's request to remove the designated scholarship funds for easier access is on hold until we meet with Edward Jones. Janitorial concerns addressed.
