## First Day of Spring March 19<sup>t</sup>

In The Story of the Easter Robin (Zonderkidz), Dandi Daley Mackall retells an old Pennsylvania Dutch tale of the robin's compassion as he witnessed Jesus' death.

On Good Friday, a plain brown robin flying over Jerusalem was curious about the "nest" atop Jesus' head. When the bird realized it was a crown of thorns, he tried to dislodge it. As the robin pulled out a long thorn from Jesus' forehead, a drop of blood landed on the bird's breast, staining it red. Now the robin's red breast is a symbol of Jesus' loving sacrifice, and the robin's early-spring song is a reminder of Jesus' joyful resurrection.

## From the Pastor

Pastor's Newsletter Article – for March 2020

Greetings, brothers and sisters in Christ! Welcome to Lent and our 40 day journey towards the Resurrection of our Lord.

Of course, the big event of this past month at Bethesda wasn't connected to any holiday or festival, but concerned the arrival of our technological improvements in our sanctuary. After months of discussion and planning and fine tuning, the TVs are up and wires and cables snaked their way through our walls. Many thanks to those that helped with all the planning and the electrical work and who provided feedback.

On one hand, we hope this will help enrich our worship service and make us a bit more ecologically friendly by reducing the amount of paper we use, but,



in another sense. this is just another tool we have added to our toolbox. The heart of our faith is still the same. We still preach the Good News of Jesus Christ. We share water and the Word. We offer bread and wine and

forgiveness for all. We bring our gifts to be shared with others. We come together and share our joys and our sorrows. These new tools should help support that ministry, not change it.

As much as Christians pray prayers and sing songs that may be hundreds or even thousands of years old and read scripture that is even older, we also have a long history of adapting to the latest technological advances. One of the first radio stations in the US, KDKA in Pittsburgh, broadcast a worship service as part of their programming lineup. Listeners back in 1921 could tune in and hear the evening vespers service of the Calvary Episcopal Church choir every Sunday night.

The 50s and 60s saw the rise of television evangelists. Oral Roberts and Billy Graham became household names thanks to this new medium. Robert Schuller in the 1980s became well known for his Crystal Cathedral broadcasts. Now, the internet is an indispensable tool for congregations of all kinds. Younger generations would find it downright suspicious if a church didn't have an online presence. And, of course, perhaps the most significant moment



of religious adoption of technology was Martin Luther and his fellow reformers and the invention of the printing press. I would like to tell you that Luther was only busy printing prayer books and hymnals and the Bible in the language of the people, but, frankly, Luther and his compatriots had a lot in common with those social media friends of yours who are always posting highly charged political comments and memes (or perhaps you are that person to your friends!).

A couple years ago when Lutherans were celebrating the 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Reformation, I visited an art museum that had an exhibit featuring various prints and paintings from that time. Among them were some of the various pamphlets and posters printed both by the reformers and the Catholic defenders.

Even though the printing press had barely just been invented, Luther and other reformers quickly figured out how to connect with the average person on the street. Rather than print big books stuffed with all their theological insights, they churned out small pamphlets to be handed out for next to nothing on street corners.

They were direct, to the point, and if the idea didn't grab you, the illustrations definitely would.

In case you are trying to figure it that strange looking print, circa 1535, this nuanced bit of theology features a demon playing a monk like a bagpipe. Of course, the Catholic counter-reformers would quickly learn to respond in kind.

And maybe this all seems like an argument against technology. Like any tool, it can be misused. It can be set to build up our world or to create instruments

to destroy it. Because, in the end, what matters is sharing the Gospel – the message of love and compassion given to us in Jesus Christ. So, we use tools both old and new to share that message with those inside our church walls and those outside of them,



and since different people often connect to their faith in different ways, we need to be flexible and creative. Blessings to you this Lent, whether you take time for prayer by reading an online devotional on your smartphone while streaming some meditative music or if you have a printed booklet to lead you through your reflections, or if you go completely old school and just take a walk out into the woods and enjoy some silence and listen to God speak. ## **Pastor's Report**–January 20, 2020 to February 17, 2020

We have definitely settled into 'winter mode' here at Bethesda, which means that some things slow down, as people head to warmer climates, and yet we still manage to stay plenty busy.

Along with Pastor Kate at Faith Lutheran, I attended the ELCA's youth ministry Extravaganza. This was my first time to attend this conference for pastors and other youth ministry workers and it went well... except for the fact that I got sick just as I arrived in California. But it was good to connect with people and learn about what other churches are doing to connect with youth. The worship services also gave me some good ideas to share with the Praise Team. Many thanks to George Smith and Val Benton for covering Sunday worship in my absence. The confirmation class helped plan and lead a worship service at Faith, Sunday, Feb. 9. I previously discussed having them lead a Lenten evening service here, but I am now looking at a possible Sunday worship date in mid-March.

Been working hard with Mary, Jim, and Julie to work with our new technology in the sanctuary. This should be a great tool to enrich our worship services. The Aitkin area pastors are going to participate in a Lent preaching 'round robin' again. The pastors will rotate among their churches for the Lenten Wednesday evening services, with a theme based around Jesus' "I AM" statements in the Gospel of John. The Together Here workshops are continuing up in Brainerd. This month, Dr. Marsha Lue will discuss the concept of "implicit bias": what it is, how it impacts our abilities to form meaningful relationships, and its potential impacts on society. In March, Kevin Kot has been rescheduled to speak on his ministry (from the canceled January date). All the meetings will be held at Trinity Lutheran Church in Brainerd, 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month, 6:30 PM – 8:30 PM.

On Feb. 9, 2020, our Heartland Conferences met to select candidates to bring to the Synod Assembly. After 8 or so ballots, those gathered (incl. Everyone is invited to 3 public candidates' forums to meet and ask questions of the nominees: Calvary Lutheran in Mora on 3/12 at 7pm, St. Andrew's in Grand Rapids on 3/13 at 7pm, Grace in Hermantown on 3/14 at 2pm.

As a member of the Bishop Election Committee, I will be helping create candidate videos to be shared online. This should be another way to get to know our nominees.

## Stop, look and listen

Lent, the season of the church year that's associated with repentance, begins on Ash Wednesday (March 5 this year). While some people deny themselves by giving up something for Lent, others prepare for Easter through special Bible studies or devotions.

Christians observe Lent for these reasons:

• It causes us to STOP. Lent says, "Stop and rest awhile," as well as "Stop doing wrong."

• It tells us to LOOK. Look inward for an honest self-examination. Look upward to see the cross of Christ offering healing and love. Look forward to the hope of the Resurrection.

• It tells us to LISTEN. Listen to the words of Christ. Listen to the voice of God. Listen to the winds of the Spirit of God.

Stop, look and listen. These three words aren't only important for our safety in travel; they're also helpful for our journey through the 40 days of Lent.
