From the Pastor

Usually, when someone asks me to name my favorite movie, I struggle. It's complicated. Too many choices. Too many variables. But there is a category of movie that holds a special place in my heart. Not genre,

mind you, category, and that category is... "movies to fall asleep to."


When I plop down on the couch early on a Sunday afternoon, ready for my post-worship nap, one movie regularly in the rotation is the 1993 Bill Murray classic "Groundhog Day." It is the perfect movie for napping - just interesting enough to be rewatchable, but not so fast paced that you hang on every scene. And not some action movie filled with gun fire or explosions (with one exception).

It also feels appropriate to rewatch this particular movie over and over. For those that have seen it, Bill Murray, or rather his character TV weatherman Phil Connors, is stuck in a time loop. He is trapped in the same day, Groundhog Day, in Punxsutawney, PA, home to one of the most well-known groundhog traditions.

Over and over he cycles through the same day. The only differences resulting from the choices he makes during the course of that day. Besides being quite funny, it is actually a pretty profound film. Phil transitions from being crass and self-centered to despair to eventually finding meaning in improving the lives of others. The initial joy that he experiences in the movie when he realizes he can do whatever he wants with no repercussions quickly turns to depression as he realizes the emptiness of those pleasures. Only when he begins to look beyond himself does his seemingly eternal Groundhog Day finally end.

One social media post I saw making the rounds recently referenced Groundhog Day, and, in particular, this shift that happens for Phil during the course of the film. Good movies, like music and art, offer that gift of speaking a truth that can be applied for even the most unexpected events that may come, even years later.

In this case, Groundhog Day might speak to our time and these challenges that we are facing. We may feel that we are stuck in a rut right now. Trapped, beyond



our control. We have fallen into new rhythms and we may be longing to break free from them.

But Christ calls us to always look beyond ourselves and to care for the wellbeing of all creation. To find a deeper meaning, no matter what circumstance we may find ourselves in.

Our church leaders have been wrestling with this question of whether and when to reopen for in-person worship. We have decided to hold off for now, but we are considering holding another drive-up communion and perhaps even outdoor worship services.

We all miss gathering together on Sunday morning, sharing bread and wine, passing the peace, joining together in song, eating cookies and drinking coffee and enjoying time for fellowship. Yet we are mindful of how risky it would be to engage in those activities in the era of Covid-19, and we would be heartbroken if our members were to become ill or pass away if we pushed to open too early.

So, for now, we will continue to live out these moments in new ways. Online worship certainly isn't perfect, but I continue to be amazed how well some of us are adapting. There is a regular group of folks who gather as soon as our worship video premieres on Sunday morning, say good morning to each other, pass the peace, offer prayers, and share bread and wine remotely.

And we will continue to imagine new ways of connecting and rely on some of the old, familiar ones too. I have heard from several folks how they are keeping in touch through phone calls and cards and enjoying some fellowship across the driveway.

This is how we get ourselves out of the rut - to look to our neighbor. We may have to share fellowship and love in new ways, we may still miss our old familiar rhythms, but God's love can be shared even in the time of Covid-19.

And remember, if you need to hear a friendly voice, Mary and I are still hanging the office most days and would enjoy the chance for little time to catch up!

Minutes of May 18, 2020, Council Meeting

In attendance: Dorothy Mundinger, Mary Braun, Pastor James Muske, Ron Haugland, Judie Birk, Cheryl Malotky, Sherry Whipple and George Smith. The meeting was called to order by council president George Smith. Pastor James gave opening Devotions.

Secretary's Report:

Motion was made to accept the minutes of the April meeting by Sherry Whipple, seconded by Ron Haglund and passed.

Treasurer's Report:

Financial review and current month activity for April was presented by Mary Braun. Council agreed to not participate in the payroll protection plan. Motion was made by Dorothy to accept the treasurer's report, seconded by Sherry Whipple and passed.

Pastor's Report - April 20, 2020

This has been our second month in the midst of the quarantine, and we do seem to be adjusting to a new rhythm, as much as it is possible, anyway.

Like last month, most of my time this past month has been spent working on planning, filming and editing online worship service and other videos. My deep gratitude to our folks (especially Mary) and to Pastor Kate and the people of Faith Lutheran for working with us during this difficult time. As I noted last month, partnering with Faith Lutheran and Pastor Kate has been helpful in terms of sharing the workload. My plan is to continue recording worship services together, but certainly, when we begin to make the switch back to more in-person worship services,

we will need to reevaluate. I would imagine we would then just stream the service live, rather than pre-record. But, obviously, there are still a number of unknowns.

I have also been working on the equipment side of the online options. Currently, most of the recording has been done through my iPhone. While it has done a pretty good job so far, it is not exactly ideal. We have also been relying on some borrowed equipment. In particular, I have been very grateful for the extended loan of a nice tripod from Melody Lackner, but I assume at some point she will want it back. I have already purchased a couple items, including a new audio recording device, which I have yet to use, but I hope it will remove some of the frustrations in trying to get good quality audio into the iPhone. However, I would suggest we also consider purchasing a nicer camera. After researching, it seems that one of the most highly recommended cameras for video photography is a Panasonic GH5 or GH5S. With a lens, it would run about \$2600. A nicer tripod would be an additional \$300. Speaking with Darlene, Praise Band funds could help with expenses.

I realize this is not cheap (though certainly not the fanciest option either), but if we do imagine that we will be recording or streaming videos for the foreseeable future, I think it would be a wise investment. I think I have figured out how to stream with our existing sanctuary camera, but, as it is attached to the wall, that limits its uses somewhat. Especially for the other, non-Sunday worship videos that we record. We are also discussing an online VBS this year. We could even consider making our equipment available to other churches, nonprofits or even individuals.

That being said, I do want to try doing the drive through communion again, as it went quite well the first time. I also think we should try hosting outdoor worship services this summer. I have also heard from John Koziol that because his church in the Cities is recording worship, he will be up here fishing more often this summer and would likely be regularly available. So that is another option to consider.

In addition to all these tech considerations, we have also seen, sadly, a couple of our members pass away – Ellen Burman and Gene Whipple. Our prayers go out to their families. We will let everyone know when and if there are plans for public services.

And again, please know (and let others know) that I am happy to arrange pastoral care over the phone or online or however else works safely. Continued thanks to all those in our congregation who have been reaching out to fellow members and neighbors, it means so much!

Thank you all for your flexibility and faithfulness during this time of quarantine!

PERSONNEL COMMITTEE PURPOSE

- 2. Assist the church council and the respective committee in hiring employees for paid positions. This includes job posting, position description

- determination, interviewing and salary/budget recommendations.
- 3. Provide annual salary/wage proposals for budget or as requested
- 4. Conduct performance reviews for paid employees on an annual basis.
- 5. Administer background checks for employees as needed.
- 6. Present reports to the council as requested.
- 7. Update the congregation as needed or appropriate through the monthly newsletter and annual report.
- 8. Give support and direction to all paid and volunteer personnel
- 9. Understand and practice confidentiality.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE PURPOSE

The primary function of the Stewardship and Finance Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of time, talents, and finances which God has entrusted to them.

DUTIES / RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Access the gifts of each member of the congregation and their interest in helping the church, and then distribute the findings to our council, respective committees, and individuals.
- 2. Establish and recommend (with input from committees) the yearly budget to council.
- 3. Review the monthly financial report of the church and make recommendations to the council as needed.
- 4. Oversee the yearly recommendations of the benevolence funds, distribute funds at end of church year.
- 5. Keep church members updated/informed on various aspects of stewardship/finances.
- 6. Oversee the functions and activity of the church financial secretary position.
- 7. Work with scholarship person on distribution of funds and guidelines.

LSS Behavioral Health Meets Community Needs Now and in the 'Next Pandemic'

During these days of the stay-at-home order caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, LSS Behavioral Health is as busy as ever. Our clinicians continue to see clients in a variety of ways. Some use online technology for virtual counseling sessions. Others use the telephone to reach clients. Still others have risen to meet the need and continue to see clients face-to-face in a limited number of crisis situations, observing social distancing guidelines as best they can in order to respond to the trauma and very difficult circumstances faced by our neighbors.

As can be expected, these days of stress and heightened anxiety bring with them increased depression and other mental health challenges. Additionally, the stressors we are facing due to this pandemic can exacerbate preexisting or latent conditions (such as addictions) and can augment domestic violence issues. The most vulnerable are the ones who experience this the worst, such as children, individuals with disabilities, those struggling with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and other mental health challenges.

LSS is ready and in a position to respond to this crisis with the highest level of care available. Predictions are that once the worst of the COVID-19 health crisis has passed, the 'next pandemic' will be mental health fallout. LSS will be there, ready to care for neighbors in need.


