#### From the Pastor


Pastor's Letter December 2020

When I was a kid, "RIP" always seemed like a strange way to honor

those who had passed. The word "rip" always seemed to have negative connotations – my mom never seemed happy when I ripped a new pair of pants. It wasn't until I understood what it actually stood for – Rest In Peace – that I warmed to it a bit... but only slightly.

I felt the same way with "Xmas" too. "X" usually indicated things kids shouldn't get into. As I got older, I warmed to it a bit, but it still seemed kind of lazy. But it wasn't until I got to seminary that I really learned what the X stood for.

A bit of trivia I remembered recently when one of our members shared with me that they don't like how Xmas seems to take the "Christ" out of Christmas. But, you see, the X actual stands for Christ! X, or what looks like an X, is actually the first letter of Christ in Ancient Greek. Take a look from the opening passage of the Gospel of Mark:



That X-word in the first line above, that is "Christos" or Christ. The X is actually a letter called Chi. You see the "X" in the very first word too, "arche" which means "beginning" (a word you recognize from words like "archaeology").

You might also notice a letter next to the Chi in Christos that looks like a "p". That is the letter "Rho" in Greek. The combination, Chi Rho, is one of the most ancient symbols in Christianity. You have probably seen in many churches, including at Bethesda on our baptismal banner:

Chi Rho dates back to at least the time of Emperor Constantine in the 4<sup>th</sup> Century. "Xmas" is not nearly that old, but it is still almost 500 years old.



So, if you were ever worried that Xmas was taking the Christ out of Christmas, worry no longer! It is all part of a really old tradition to both honor Jesus and save a little space on whatever you are writing or printing.

And, of course, we know that more than the name of the holiday itself, Christ calls us to be a living example of his life and teachings in many and various ways.

As much as we try to remember this every year (and not get too lost in all the delicious food, the fun traditions, and the presents), this year our world needs the love that Christ embodied more than ever. A time for the hungry to be fed and to give the thirsty a drink. A time for the stranger to be welcomed and those without warm clothes to receive them. A time for those who are sick to be cared for and for those who care for the sick to be cared for in return. A time for those who are imprisoned or just stuck in selfquarantine, to know that they are not alone and abandoned. These are just some of the ways that Christ teaches us how to love as he loves us.

No matter if we prefer Xmas or the whole Christmas, whether we speak English or Greek, and even if we are following all the social distancing guidelines, may we all bring some of that Christmas hope and joy to one another. Blessings to you and your family this Christmas!

Minutes of November 16, 2020 Council Meeting

The meeting was called to order by council president George Smith, Dennis Hennessey gave opening Devotions.

#### Secretary's Report:

Motion was made to accept the minutes of the October meeting by Mary Braun, seconded by Sherry Whipple and passed.

#### Treasurer's Report:

Financial view and current month activity for October was presented by Mary Braun. Falling short of projected income. We had a large expense with the parsonage driveway and have the parsonage fund is now at zero, which is a good thing that all the monies given towards the Parsonage from the three-year fund drive was spent on the Parsonage. Now is the time that we really need donations. Mary will put in newsletter about RMDs (Required Minimum Distribution) for those 70 years or older you can get a tax break. Pastor suggested doing a stewardship temple talk online and post it on Facebook/Web site. Motion was made by Dorothy to accept the treasurer's report, seconded by Sherry Whipple and passed.

Pastor's Report: (October to November 16, 2020) Greetings sisters and brothers in Christ!

My weeks continue to be packed with planning, recording, and editing videos for worship. Many thanks to the Praise Band for helping provide some lovely hymn singing for our services. Did take a pause due to potential Covid exposure, but we know that people do enjoy music with singers.

Trying to figure out what would be the best option if I want to take a Sunday off, since I am not just the one that leads the services, but also handles all the technology.

The first in-person worship went well, but with rising Covid rates, my recommendation would be to not hold one in November. Council can discuss options for Christmas.

Confirmation classes have switched to online only,

due to the spike in Covid. The students seem to be getting better with online classes, so the last couple classes have gone a bit more smoothly than past online attempts.

I have been trying to call more people, as folks are feeling a bit of "Covid fatigue" and there are folks we haven't heard from in a while. However, it would be a good idea to try and enlist more help from congregation members in assisting with outreach efforts (as has been done in the past).

Also trying to brainstorm ideas for other online small group/bible study meetings.

#### **Old Business**

- Flu Shots Update the clinic was here earlier this month and went fine. The church service on October 25th had about 30 people and it went well.
- Next Year's Budget Council reviewed the proposed budget. We really don't have accurate numbers because of the pandemic this year, but we will base the budget on this year's giving. Once Covid is over, hopefully donations will go up. Sherry made a motion to accept the budget as written and Cheryl seconded and carried.
- The Lions Club thanks us for the use of our kitchen. And the veterans than them!

#### New Business

Cheryl Malotky brought to the council that we should consider having Zoom gatherings for bible studies, ROMEOS, fellowship, etc. Cheryl and Pastor will look into this option.

Annual Meeting? (Online, In Person or Postpone) — Council discussed postponing our Annual Meeting until possibly April, when we may have a COVID-19 vaccine. Pastor said it might be possible to do a Online meeting. However, we need to ask our congregation if they agree with postponing the annual meeting and would need a 10% quorum. George Smith will contact the NE Synod to see if they have anything in place for delaying annual meetings. If we can do, Mary will send out a letter to the voting members of the congregation to acquire the 10% quorum signatures. We don't have much time as the meeting is otherwise scheduled for Dec. 6<sup>th</sup>. So members please respond if you get a letter. Make a recommendation that we've revise the budget under current circumstance and want to delay meeting until April. The budget will be contingent. We need to elect new officers. George will ask the synod and ask how we need to handle this. Another option is to have a parking lot meeting using the radio transmission equipment. Annual Giving — Contributions are a down during this pandemic. Money is being dropped off or sent via mail. Some are coming in through automatic payments. A Simply Given form was in the November newsletter and we did not receive any. A reminder is needed to explain to our congregation about giving. Mary will check with Stewardship and post a online video on giving.

Should We Have in Person Service in December? With COVID-19 rates going up, it was decided not to do any service in December. Other options were discussed, such as having music videos online. Concern about people not getting information was discussed. Possibly calling older members to see if they are able to view the services, getting the newsletter and their well-being. The current members of the Stewardship Committee, Barb Forrester, Mary Braun, and Donna Ansell met to discuss the Proposed Budget for 2021 which will be presented to the Church Council at their next meeting on November 16, 2020.

The budget will cover the months of Jan–Dec of 2021. Revisions were made to income and expenses based on last year's budget and current year's abridged budget figures. Our Proposed Budget for 2021 will be:



Donations to ELCA World Hunger are encouraged and will support our church's work to respond to hunger and poverty in more than 60 countries around the world.

#### **Keeping Christmas**

Are you willing to believe that love is the strongest thing in the world — stronger than hate, stronger than evil, stronger than death — and that the blessed life which began in Bethlehem [two thousand] years ago is the image and brightness of the Eternal Love? Then you can keep Christmas. And if you can keep it for a day, why not always? But you can never keep it alone.



#### What is an RMD?

Once you hit age 70<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, the IRS requires you to start withdrawing from—and paying taxes on—most types of tax-advantaged retirement accounts, this is know as "**R**equired **M**inimum **D**istribution". You will also need to take RMDs from any retirement accounts you inherit. In most cases, RMDs are treated as ordinary income for tax purposes.

## Can I donate my RMD to charity and avoid the taxes?

YES. These "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCDs) will not be added to your taxable income for the year. A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA, payable directly to a qualified charity, as described in the QCD provision in the Internal Revenue Code. Amounts distributed as a QCD can be counted toward satisfying your RMD for the year, up to \$100,000. The QCD is excluded from your taxable income. This is not the case with a regular withdrawal from an IRA, even if you use the money to make a charitable contribution later. If you take a withdrawal, the funds would be counted as taxable income even if you later offset that income with the charitable contribution deduction.

Making a QCD as opposed to a normal charitable gift has two main advantages. First, a QCD counts toward satisfying the individual's required minimum distribution for that year. Second, the distribution is excluded from the taxpayer's income. (Information taken from the website:

#### Is Bethesda Lutheran Church a QCD?

**YES**! A charity must be a 501(c)(3) organization in order to receive tax-free IRA charitable contributions. Bethesda is a 501(c)(3) organization.

If you are 72, own an IRA, and donate to charity, QCDs may make sense for you; as *always, consult your tax advisor or accountant to see if this is to your advantage*.





#### "How can I give if I'm not attending services in person?"

The shift to virtual ministry has changed how we pray; interact with the church – and how we fulfill our offerings.
