Epiphany

Though overshadowed by falling so soon after Christmas, Epiphany is one of the three major Christian celebrations along with Christmas and Easter. It is always celebrated on January 6th and commemorates the presentation of the infant Jesus to the Magi or the three wise men.

Epiphany is celebrated annually in Christian churches on January 6. The word "epiphany" comes from a Greek word meaning "manifestation" or "showing forth." Its focus is on the legendary arrival of the Magi (three wise men) after the birth of Christ. They followed the light of a star to find the Light of the World.

The wise men were not Jews but Gentiles, which shows that Christ came not only for Jews but for all other people on Earth. Thus, all of us who are Gentile Christians are in the lineage of the Magi, the first Gentiles who came to Christ.

We are Never Alone

The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton Presiding Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

The room was spare and dimly lit.

We sat on folding chairs in a circle—young Honduran women and some of us from the ELCA. We had come to Honduras to observe the work of AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities). This is the ELCA's strategy to help youth who have been forced to flee their home countries because of violence, abuse, extortion by gangs and extreme poverty. Amparo is the Spanish word for shelter or refuge.

In this case, AMMPARO partnered with the Lutheran World Federation and the Mennonites to resettle returned migrants— those who had tried to seek asylum in the United States but had failed or had been denied and deported back to Honduras.

One by one they told us their stories of fear and desperation. Not a one undertook the long and dangerous trek north on a whim. They told us about the abuse they had suffered, about family members who had been killed by gangs, about the inability to make a living because of the extortion by organized crime. They talked about the bitter sadness of leaving home and family, and the uncertainty of the future.

I remember one young woman in particular. She was pregnant when she tried to migrate to the United States. She had the baby somewhere along the way. She was far from home, mostly alone and desperately wanted her mother to be with her. None of this is what she had hoped for when she was growing up.

Circumstances beyond her control had forced her into this new and strange existence. She and her baby were now back in Honduras—but not at home. Home was too dangerous.

Remember last Christmas? Remember all of the preparations, the travel to be with family? Remember the holy beauty of the Christmas Eve liturgy and receiving Christ's grace and forgiveness at his table? The shopping and Christmas caroling? The in-person gatherings? All that has changed.

The pandemic hasn't forced us from our homes but into our homes, sheltering in place, isolated. Not together, but physically distanced. Not gathered with family and friends, but forced apart because of the threat of infection. Forced by circumstances beyond our control into this strange existence. Oh, there will be Christmas carols piped into grocery stores and other essential services, but they will be painful reminders of how life used to be.

We are reminded of the experience of the exiles in Babylon: "By the rivers of Babylon—there we sat down and there we wept when we remembered Zion. On the willows there we hung up our harps. For there our captives asked us for songs, and our tormentors asked for mirth, saying, 'Sing us one of the songs of Zion!' How could we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land" (Psalm 137)?

I told the young Honduran woman about another young woman who was forced to leave home because of a government decree. She, too, was pregnant and made a long and difficult journey. She, too, was far from home and without her mother when the baby came. She had to find shelter wherever she could. This wasn't what she had hoped for when she was growing up. Circumstances beyond her control had forced her into this new existence.

That young woman was Mary and the child was Jesus. Precisely in our distress, in our dislocation, the Lord shows up. Emmanuel—God with us—makes his home in the very places we find foreign or isolating. The young Honduran woman, and all of us, can find hope because of the birth of Mary's child. There is no God-forsaken place and we are never alone—not in hospital rooms, or sheltering in place, or Zoom calls or on dangerous roads.

Many of us will not be physically home for Christmas, but we are truly home in Christ.

The meeting was called to order by council vice president Dennis Hennesey.
Pastor James gave opening Devotions.

Secretary's Report:

Motion was made to accept the minutes of the November meeting by Mary Braun, seconded by Cheryl Malotky, and passed.

Treasurer's Report:

Financial view and current month activity for November was presented by Mary Braun. Mary said incoming contributions are low, but thankfully we had the interest from the Edward Jones account to use this past month. Motion was made by Sherry Whipple to accept the treasurer's report, seconded by Cheryl Malotky and passed.

Pastor's Report –November to December 21, 2020 Busy, busy, busy yet again with planning, recording, and editing videos for worship. Continued thanks to the Praise Band for their musical gifts. Also, gratitude to my family for helping provide music this month as well.

We were also grateful to be able to record music with John Koziol again this year. I feel his fee was well worth it, as we were able to not only record for the Lessons & Carols service, but for Christmas Eve and the first Sunday in January.

Confirmation classes continue to be going as well as can be expected over Zoom.

Still reaching out over the phone to members, but thankfully, with Darlene's help, a calling circle has been organized and have been busy calling. The intention is for me to lead the funeral service for George Smith down near Albert Lea on January 9, 2021 for immediate family only. My hope is to record that service so it may be shared with our congregation and others.

Since that will require extra travel time and editing time, I have asked Terry Frovik to record a sermon for the Sunday, January 10 worship service to take a little off my plate.

Also grateful for Cheryl and Mary Vukelich (and Mary Braun, of course), for helping organize and offering to help form online social opportunities. Still trying to manage some self care in the midst of all the challenges. Hope to take a little time off the week after Christmas, but still trying how to figure out how a longer vacation would work.

Old Business

- Annual Meeting we cannot postpose the meeting per the synod. So, we need a minimum of 25 people to attend a meeting for a quorum. What format do we want to do for this? Council discussed options and decided that we will have the annual meeting along with a worship service. Mary made a motion to move the annual meeting to January 31st following an in-person worship service. Motion was seconded by Sherry Whipple and passed. All state guidelines for in person meetings will be followed (masks, six feet distancing, etc.).
- Annual Giving we're down about \$9,500 for the past four months. We do have some people sending in their donations. Mary is still providing ways of giving via the newsletter, Facebook, and our website. We need an appeal for donations. If this continues, we may need to tighten our budget, and this should be discussed at the annual meeting.

New Business

- Election for church council we have some people in mind.
- C10.08 Constitution Amendment (remote meeting) — this is something we need to talk about at the annual meeting so our congregation can do remote meetings. It needs to be added to our constitution.
- Contributions to the synod for 2021. Dennis has the paperwork and will give to Mary. We typically give 6% of our general offerings.

Motion was made to adjourn by Mary Braun, seconded by Sherry Whipple, and passed. The council closed with the Lord's Prayer. The next council meeting will be Jan. 18 at 10 am. Respectfully submitted by Judie Birk, council secretary.
