From the Pastor

"Blessings and Easter greetings to you! After the reflection and confession of Lent, we regularly rejoice when Easter season springs forth, but perhaps this year, more than many previous, we eagerly embrace the new life

that Christ's resurrection stirs in us. Even as we still try to be a little careful and manage our expectations, it is hard not to be hopeful as vaccinations make their way through our communities and restrictions are eased and life feels like it might finally get back to normal, or at least in the "normal" ballpark.

Still, we would do well to not rush too quickly or too blindly back to what came before. Such is the lesson of Easter. Below is another article I have found helpful recently. (And the fact that your pastor continues to rely on the wisdom of others, instead of writing a whole long article himself, is another sign that we are still transitioning from the busy, chaotic time of the pandemic, ha!)

"Will The Congregation Come Back?" Should Not Be Our Biggest Concern

(6 Better Questions) By Karl Vaters / Feb 26, 2021

It's the question on every pastor's heart and mind right now. We understand why people haven't been coming to church through the pandemic. Especially for those whose church buildings haven't reopened yet, of course.

But once it's over will they ever come back?

No one knows for sure.

But I'm not worried. At all.

First, because the church of Jesus has survived bigger crises than this one.

Second, because "will the congregation come back to church?" should not be the question that keeps us awake at night.

There are so many better questions we need to ask. Questions that will get us thinking more clearly and biblically about what to do next.

Here are a few of them:

1. "Have we represented Jesus well during the lockdown?"

If the answer to this question is "maybe not", that

will also give us a big hint about why some people might not be coming back.

Plus, those of us in the church are not the best ones to judge how well we've done this. We need to ask others. And we need to take their answers seriously – especially if it isn't what we want to hear.

We've been given a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to show who we really are over the past year or so. If we haven't responded as well as we should, we need to fix that.

No matter how well we've done this (or think we've done it), we can always be better representatives of Jesus.

2. "Are we representing Jesus well as we come out of the lockdown?"

As restrictions start lifting, we'll need to make a lot of choices about issues we've never even considered before.

From physical safety, to emotional challenges, to disagreements about those decisions.

The goal should never be to get more people in the building, or even to move ahead without causing conflict. It must always be "are we representing Jesus well as we move forward?"

3. "What have we learned – and what are we still learning?"

If all we do at the end of this is try to get back to "normal", we will not just have missed an opportunity to learn, we will have failed Jesus. Yes, that's strong language. But I believe it to be true.

Going through this and not learning from it is like the third servant in Jesus' Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30). After refusing to invest what he received, the master treated him with some of the harshest words and actions in the entire Bible. There's a lot to learn through this. Those lessons are like great treasure. Don't bury them, invest them in kingdom work.

4. "How can we better serve the people at home?" Many of the folks who won't come back to the physical building have all kinds of reasons for it. From being at-risk physically to not being ready emotionally, and more.

Don't criticize people who aren't ready to come back to church yet. Reach out to them. Lovingly, kindly and compassionately. Blessing people where they are is more important than getting them to show up where we are.

5. "How well are we serving our online church members and visitors?"

We are in a new era of church attendance and involvement. People have come to know Jesus through our online services who have never been in our building. And many never will. Some because they live too far away, some due to ongoing physical risks, others who have trauma from church history, and more.

If people have chosen to participate in your online services, thank them for it and figure out how to serve them well.

- Have an online pastor available during the live stream (if you don't have multiple staff members, train a trusted church volunteer to answer basic questions and redirect online guests to more info)
- Acknowledge them from the pulpit
- Place the camera in a spot that feels inviting
- Guide them to further online help and activities

Online church is new territory, even for churches that have been doing it for a few years. We're all learning how to do it better. The most important aspect of online church isn't how to make the tech better, it's how to make it personal.

6. "How are people hurting, and what can we do to help them?"

People's problems will not be over when the pandemic ends.

Instead, we will be heading into years of crisis and recovery that are likely to see record numbers of

More than ever, the communities around us are going to need the help of healthy, missional, compassionate, worshiping, and loving churches.

Whether people come back through our church doors is not the big issue. How we honor Jesus by reaching the hurting people outside our doors is what matters.

Ministry needs to happen from the church, not just in the church.

These services generally have lower attendance and with your pastor also being the tech person, it would be difficult to accommodate so many services in such a short time frame.

As noted last month, our confirmation class has been having online/in-person check in meetings after the Wednesday evening services. It is a good way to help encourage reflection and to just keep in communication with them.

Pastor Kate and I have also begun planning for a summer canoe trip with the confirmation students. The idea would be to spend 2-3 days heading down the Mississippi.

I will also work with our VBS folks to discuss how we might offer a program this summer.

The 2021 Synod Assembly will be the weekend of April 30 - May 2. Because of COVID concerns the assembly will be held remotely, similar to the one we had in August 2020. The quilt auction will also be online.

I may try to take some time off after Easter, though it may depend on my ability to receive the vaccine.

Joanne asked if Synod will be making any rulings on in-service VBS. Mary said she would check with the Synod. Joanne suggested we do a survey of our congregation to get a feel how much participation we would get.

LED Digital Signage Information

At the recent church council meeting, a discussion about purchasing electronic signage for the roadside suggested that an article be put this newsletter for the congregation to consider.

The cost of purchasing and installing a LED display is quite pricey. Mary Braun got three bids with a range of \$5,800 to over \$20,000, with the lower price not including installation. When discussed at council, it was thought that this may not be an appropriate time to be spending that kind of money. Council would appreciate your input on this. Here are the pros and cons:

Pro: A lighted double-sided LED sign would be more noticeable from the highway both ways! The sign has software built in so messages can be made remotely and typed in. Messages can be changed multiple times and can have rotating text.

Con: Our present signposts are rotting and needs replacing. Current plans are that the Property Committee is replacing the posts with metal ones and we could continue using the "Changeable Text" sign we currently have. The message on the sign needs to be done manually by someone.

STEWARDSHIP & FINANCE COMMITTEE



In the early years of Christianity, a worship service called Tenebrae (Latin for "shadows") was held during Holy Week. Today many churches hold a Tenebrae service on the evening of Good Friday, the night Christ died.

For those who knew and loved him, that night must have been the darkest night of their lives. Imagine their shock, despair, gnawing grief and utter hopelessness.

The Tenebrae service moves from light into darkness. The service usually begins in a dim light. The chancel, cross and altar are often draped with black cloth and the altar may have 13 candles - one representing each of the 12 disciples and one larger one symbolizing Christ.

To begin the service, an appropriate prayer is offered or a hymn about Jesus the Light of the world is sung.

In some services, 12 people, representing the apostles, make brief individual statements about their relationship to Christ. After speaking, the "apostle" lights one altar candle. When 12 candles are burning, the pastor lights the Christ candle.

A voice from outside the sanctuary reads Isaiah 53:3-9, followed by the pastor's reading of Matthew 27:45-46 and Mark 14:43-50. The moment the pastor reads, "All of them deserted him and fled," each apostle walks quickly to his candle and extinguishes it. Next, the pastor extinguishes the Christ candle, and the remaining church lights are turned off. After a period of silent reflection, one light is turned on allowing worshipers to exit quietly and safely. The pastor may say finally, "We leave in the shadows, mindful of our Lord's death on the world's behalf."

There are other variations of this powerfully moving and memorable service.

Traditionally the Vacation Bible School experience at Bethesda happens from 9:00-11:30am during the 3rd full week of June 21-25. With churches and schools opening with CDC guidelines in effect, we are wondering if we should consider having Vacation Bible School this year. The restrictions of wearing masks and social distancing would require adjustments to the singing, snacks, and education in close settings.

Online Reflections A Message from Pr. Rollie Bockbrader

Be Busy as a Bee!

Salem Lutheran in Hermantown (my last call) has stained glass windows in the sanctuary. There are three sets of five panels. One feature of the stained glass is



the River of Life flowing through each panel, flowing through various stories of the Bible.

In the last two panels (Regeneration and Revelation/Apocalypse) you see a honeycomb and a honeybee. The artist who made the windows wrote this description and I paraphrase, "The bee represents the disciples – you and me today – being busy doing the work in the fields and the harvest – to be busy as a bee!" The honeycomb is our work. The sides of each comb number six, "the six sides symbolize the six days of creation as God continues to 'make all things new!""



Tracy and I have honeybees. We think it's good for the earth. When we harvest honey, we think it's good for us! Wintering bees has not

been a strong point for us. I build a temporary shelter around the hive to give some protection from the winter cold and moisture. Last fall we did not do the winter prep work. I thought for sure the bees would not survive the winter – like most of our bees in the past, especially without my protection.

A couple weeks ago, on a warm day in February, Tracy texted me, "I saw a couple of bees!" I didn't think much about it at the time. A few days later I noticed a couple marks on the side window of my car; it was a brownish streak about three quarters of an inch long – like a pencil mark or a small, dry pine needle. It was bee poop! I was very excited about seeing bee poop!

I share a word of explanation. Bees have three generations each year. The big one is the spring and summer bee generation – the one that gathers the pollen, make the comb and the honey. The second one comes later in the summer; they finish up the work. The third generation is the one that is hatched late fall; smaller in number and their job is to protect the queen and keep her warm. This generation does not leave the hive until it warms up outside, when temperatures get above 40 degrees. The winter bees have not gone to the bathroom for months. Uff dah! That is why I was happy seeing bee pomp. Our bees were alive! They were pooping! Soon they were getting ready to work and prepare the way for the next generation!

We are like honey bees. We live in community. We work and rest and play and support one another. We are parts of a bigger community – God's family, God's children. God's Spirit flows in and through us, inviting us to help other, to invite others, to walk alongside others and to love others. God has given us a task to do and a harvest to reap. Let's be busy as bees!

Take care, stay safe and let God work through us!
