Minutes of May 17, 2021Council Meeting

The meeting was called to order by council president Dennis Hennessy

Pastor James gave opening Devotions. <u>Pastor's Report (April 19-May 17, 2021)</u> Not much to report since I was on vacation for two weeks, but a few items to note:

Confirmation will be on Pentecost Sunday, May 23 at 9:30am. Our three youth affirming their baptisms are Savannah Elliott, Will Vukelich, and Mark Vossen.

In the middle of my vacation, I remotely attended the online Synod Assembly.

As more of our members transition back to attending worship in person versus online, we will continue to provide a video recording of the service, but without as much editing. I also plan to switch to editing and uploading the video on Monday morning instead of Sunday afternoon. If there is a mass outcry, perhaps we can revisit options, but this should make for a more manageable work schedule.

I also plan to begin restarting our Bible studies.

Now that Pastor Kate has ended her time at Faith Lutheran in Isle, they are going to have a period of time where they are without a pastor, until an interim pastor can be assigned. They have asked if I could fill in perhaps once a month, so that I could preside over communion. My thought is that I could leave after the first service once a month and then go down there, with one of our lay members covering the second service. My sermon from the first service could be recorded and played at the second. I will discuss this idea with them some more. They would likely only need this assistance for a couple months.

### Secretary's Report:

Motion was made to accept the minutes of the April meeting by Sherry Whipple seconded by Karen Carron, and passed.

## Treasurer's Report:

Financial view and current month activity for April was presented by Mary Braun. Mary noted that we have more 'in-person' attendance. Motion was made by Cheryl Malotky to accept the treasurer's report, seconded by Sherry Whipple and passed.

## Old Business

She also suggested we need to add the church building/property values to our assets. Mary will work with Linda on this.

### New Business

## Property Committee:

The Property Committee requests funds to repair three doors.

The Veggie Stand door has been leaking and is difficult to open. The floor in front of the door is rotted and needs to be repaired, plus the door frame and threshold.

The side door of the Parsonage Garage is rotting and the bottom of the brick molding and should be replaced.

The east entry door of the Church Garage is rotting at the bottom and will need to be replaced.

The total cost of the three doors and floor section replacement in the Veggie Stand is \$1,775.00,

including aluminum wrap to prevent future damage. The Property Committee suggests doing all the doors together, but the projects could be separated if need be. The Veggie Stand repairs are more immediate. The bid was given by a local contractor. We look forward to your guidance.

## SIGN UPDATE:

Steel signposts (6" x 6") will replace the wooden posts within a 3-4 week time frame. The post costs and installation are covered by a generous member. The cost to remove and reinstall the old sign will have to be covered by our church, including electric hook-up.

SPRING CLEAN-UP:

A spring clean-up is scheduled for May 26<sup>th</sup>. We hope to clean the windows at that time.

## From the Pastor

Greetings, fellow disciples in Christ!

After a year of pandemic precautions and quarantines, life is starting to feel a bit more normal. Life is starting to feel a

bit, well, livelier! Of course, as much as we are ready to put this past year behind us, we should try and remember that 1) the virus is not completely beat yet, especially around the world, and 2) this past year laid bare many of the aspects of our world and our society that need improvement. In our rush to return to normal, we should first acknowledge that some of our "normals" need to be revamped, if not replaced.

Reforms to our health care and senior care systems and better care for our caregivers. Safety precautions and other support for those who work front line jobs. Efficient and effective aid programs for small businesses and those that lose their job. Care for all the teachers, staff, and students that struggled through this crazy year. And realizing the way that these systems may work better for some groups than others. Not to mention continuing all the important conversations about race and justice that were begun this year.

There is an immense amount of suffering and need out there in our world, and we, as Christians, are called to respond. To, at least, listen and bear witness. To pray. To ask for forgiveness when we have contributed to that suffering or failed to respond. To be gracious and patient with one another, and to be mindful of all those that may be suffering in ways we cannot immediately recognize.

One group of people that haven't received much attention this past year and are especially relevant to us as a Christian community are our pastors and other church leaders – deacons, youth and family ministers, office staff, chaplains, etc. Like many other caregivers, church workers often have horrible selfcare. We regularly put ourselves last on our mental hierarchies of people in need. The thought of acknowledging our own struggles fills us with guilt. Including me, right now, as I am typing these words.

Over this last year, as I met with fellow clergy over Zoom or other online conversations, or the rare inperson meetings, the stress that everyone was feeling was so rarely verbalized. Yet it always seemed to be there on the edges of the conversations. It seemed like we were all too afraid to let those flood gates open. But you could see it in people's faces, in smiles that faded a bit too quick. You could hear it in their voices, a note of exhaustion that seemed to build more and more throughout the year.

It was heartbreaking. Because pastors, surprisingly, are actually a lot of fun. Yes, it can be hard for some of us to turn off "pastor-mode", but, generally, we are a witty and intelligent lot, with lots of hidden talents and interests. And even when we are sharing frustrations and horror stories, there remains this love for our communities and our world – a battle-tested hopefulness – which I find so life-giving.

But this year has added burden after burden, weighing us down and wearing us out. I was fortunate to have some familiarity with the technology, but even for me, it was difficult to completely change models of ministry almost overnight and then having to adjust again and again as new guidelines came out. Spending so much time sitting alone behind a computer screen also takes its toll. Even those of us on the more introverted side of the spectrum tend to prefer flesh and blood human beings to their digitized versions.

The world changed and so we did our best to adapt. But now we had to work twice as hard to create these remote experiences, and to work twice as hard to create half as much. Knowing that it isn't the same, that for all its benefits, it had serious downsides too. We sympathized with those that didn't like all the changes, and yet it was hard not to be frustrated at the same time because of all the effort involved. Exhausting to be the one to bear most of the changes that were needed to make something, anything happen, and knowing that it is not going to be fully satisfying, knowing that some would not even try out the new options.

And, again, to be frustrated and then to feel completely guilty for that frustration. Because others are going through this collective trauma too, and many dealing with much more than us. This has been a year of our hearts constantly breaking.

Then, to top it off, this is a year where we have also felt so divided, and not just in a social distancing sense. To realize again that the wounds of racial injustice have never fully healed (and the struggle of how to have such a difficult conversation while we can't even meet in person!). To see our political divisions grow even wider. To see how divided we were in how to respond to the virus and the precautions we should take, and to see even that issue become politicized.

Congregations, along with the rest of society, were torn on the right path forward. Balancing those who desire that every precaution be taken with those who claimed the virus was a hoax. Church leaders caught in the middle. Treated with suspicion when they try to keep people safe. Agonizing over compromises and then facing disapproval and resistance. Even facing public criticism, like that in one of our local papers last year, where a letter printed in the religion section (not Opinion) stated that if Jesus was alive that he would open the churches and if people died, so be it, and if pastors refused, they should be fired. To say that such theories are less than helpful is to put it mildly.

Of course, our pastors and other leaders are also, at the end of the day, human beings. People with families and friends. People who worried, like so many worried, about loved ones getting sick. People who worried about their own health. People who mourned when those they loved succumbed to the disease. People, many of whom are parents, who now had to figure out schooling and childcare. People who worried about the financial realities of the pandemic. Not just for those in their community, but for their churches and themselves personally. It is hard for us to admit, but we are human, with all the blessings, sins, and limitations that comes with humanity. We rely just as much as any on the grace of God and hope for it from our neighbor.

Our Church has failed our leaders (big C church, as in the general Christian church on earth; our little individual church I would rate as not perfect, but above average (2)). Our leaders have born a lot of the weight for us this past year. The weight of countless changes and endless debates. The weight of long hours and little time to grieve and find renewal. They have born that weight and it has wounded many of us in the process. There are already many signs throughout the country that clergy burnout will be a rapidly growing challenge for communities of faith. Researchers regularly report the damaging physical and mental effects of stress and overwork. We as a people of God need to do a better job caring for those who care for us.

And, again, this is not to put church leaders on a pedestal or declare them to be the only or those most suffering. But perhaps, for our congregations, our leaders are a bit like the canary in the coal mine. If we

cannot care, be gracious, and generous towards those who we call to encourage and teach us about grace and generosity and caring for others, it doesn't bode well for our mission as disciples more broadly.

I still feel completely guilty and self-centered sharing all this, but I also can't bear to keep silent. Such is the nature of lament, even in the Bible. It is rarely pretty or perfect. I thank you for reading all this and hope you didn't roll your eyes too many times. If I am brave, I might even share this on social media. Because, besides other suggestions that I might make someday in a "part 2", my hope is that one step congregations can make is to simply be better at asking their pastor how they are doing. To ask, not just in passing, but to take some time, have a little privacy, build an environment of trust, maybe over coffee or a meal, to ask and to then be patient. To be quiet and let them share, if they want, and then to take what they say seriously.

Neither is that to pretend, I should note, that pastors are perfect, I know I am far from it. Some decisions from the past year I would do differently, some I think I nailed (ha!), and the bulk falls under that category of "doing the best you can with what you got."

Life should be a continual learning process, and, as a church, we should exemplify that. As I noted, our church seems to have handled this past year a bit better than many others, in stories I have heard from colleagues near and far. But there is still room for improvement. Still, as I end, I want to express my gratitude for our council, for Mary in the office, for our Praise Band, and other lay leaders this past year. Even when we had disagreements, it always felt like we were in this together. So, thank you!

I know this isn't the shortest or cheeriest letter I have ever written, but I thank you for letting me share it. God blessings on you this month and always! Yours in Christ,
