From the Pastor

"Don't do anything only to get ahead. Don't do it because you are proud. Instead, be free of pride. Think of others as better than yourselves. None of you should look out just for your own good. You should also look out for the good of others. You should think in the same way Christ Jesus does." (Philippians 2:3–5)

Concluding my reflections on those who serve on behalf of others, even in the face of their own suffering and loss, I would like to lift up the truth tellers of our world. In the Bible, the prophets frequently faced retribution, whether from rulers or the general public. Of course, for those of us not receiving our instructions from a burning bush, figuring out the truth can be a bit of a challenge. The best modern day truth tellers tend to be those that are also great listeners. They listen, they study, they reflect, and they may have had some profound personal experience that set them on their path. In recent years, September 30 has become a day for difficult truth telling. It has become a day of remembrance for generations of Native Americans that suffered from the legacy of boarding schools in our country and Canada.

A painful chapter in our history as Americans and one that has not been well known outside of native communities. For years, our government, with support from Christian churches, forcibly removed native children from their homes and punished them if they spoke their language. Even after forcible removal ended, many schools still treated native language and culture as something undesirable. This remembrance is also referred to as "Orange Shirt Day" (I was encouraged to see a photo of many

Onamia school staff and students wearing orange last week). Orange Shirt Day is largely credited to a woman named Phyllis Webstad. As a child, Phyllis was heartbroken when her orange shirt, a gift from her grandmother, was taken from her upon arriving at a Canadian mission school in 1973. In her words: "The color orange has always reminded me of that and how my feelings didn't matter, how no one cared and how I felt like I was worth nothing. All of us little children were crying and no one cared."

As Christians, one of the most powerful blessings we can bestow is to simply listen. The last two years have only added to the challenges we face and perhaps we wonder what difference we could make. We may not be scientists or policy experts, but most of us can manage to sit still for a little while and be a listening ear for someone in need. We may not all be blessed with a prophetic voice, but we can at least give the gift of our time and our compassion.

For more information on Boarding Schools, I would recommend U of MN professor Brenda Child's book *Boarding School Seasons*.

Motion was made to adjourn by Sherry Whipple and seconded by Cheryl Malotky and passed.


The council closed with the Lord's Prayer. The next council meeting will be November 15 at 10

STEWARDSHIP

Time * Talent * Treasure

"What does stewardship look like in our lives today?" Unfortunately, many associate the idea of stewardship with sermons they have heard about church budgets and building programs. A better way to look at it is: It's where the concepts of faith, work and economics intersect.

Here are four important principles about biblical stewardship might help us understand:

1. The principle of ownership.

In the beginning of Genesis, God creates everything and puts Adam in the Garden to work it and to take care of it. It is clear that man was created to work, and that work is the stewardship of all of the creation that God has given him.

This is the fundamental principle of biblical stewardship. God owns everything, we are simply managers or administrators acting on his behalf.

Therefore, stewardship expresses our obligation regarding the administration of everything God has placed under our control, which is all encompassing. Stewardship is the commitment of oneself and possessions to God's service.

Echoing Deuteronomy 8:17, we might say: "My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me." But Deuteronomy 8:18 counsels us to think otherwise: "Remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth."

2. The principle of responsibility.

We are called as God's stewards to manage that which belongs to God. While God has graciously entrusted us with the care, development, and enjoyment of everything he owns as his stewards, we are responsible to manage his holdings well and according to his desires and purposes.

3. The principle of accountability.

A steward is one who manages the possessions of another. We are all stewards of the resources, abilities, and opportunities that God has entrusted to our care.

Like the servants in the Parable of the Talents, we will be called to give an account of how we have administered everything we have been given, including our time, money, abilities, information,

wisdom, relationships, and authority.

We will all give account to the rightful owner as to how well we managed the things he has entrusted to us.

4. The principle of reward.

In Colossians 3:23-24 Paul writes: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving."

We all should long to hear the master say what he exclaims in Matthew 25:21: "Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!"

As Christians in the 21st century, we need to embrace this larger biblical view of stewardship, which goes beyond church budgets or building projects, though important; it connects everything we do with what God is doing in the world.

Our stewardship of creation involves the caretaking of the environment and animals as well as our families and communities. Being a good steward in this world is one way of expressing our love for God and our gratitude to Him.
