From the Pastor

Merry Christmas, sisters and brothers in Christ!

Though it always seems to sneak up on me, I am a firm believer that we, as a church and as a people of

God, are often at our best this time of year. We live out our faith more powerfully and openly, and sometimes without even realizing it.

Of course, it helps that we have the Christmas story that we do. It is a story that people can quickly grasp. God's own son, a presence of the divine, born not in some palace hall, not born into all the trappings of earthly power and wealth. Not even born in some high priest's home or some other symbol of religious hierarchy. No, a child born into humble surroundings. The ordinary and the extraordinary combined.

And, yes, okay, if we are being honest, sometimes modern-day Christmastime can be a bit extravagant. We can indulge a bit too much in consumeristic and culinary pleasures. And yes, sure, sometimes our Christmas decorations are so bright they could help land aircraft, but I am not suggesting that we throw out our twinkling lights, tinsel, and trays full of cookies.

Certainly, we should not let all the superficial trappings of the holidays become so central in our hearts and minds that they squeeze out everything else or let ourselves get so stressed out trying to do everything we are "supposed to do." But I do think we are able to use superficial elements of Christmas to live out our faith.

Those Christmas lights make these long winter nights a bit less gloomy. Wreaths and garlands add a bit of green back into our lives. These are not bad gifts to share with our community. Sure, some of us might get a bit burnt out on cookies and sweets even before the 25th, but even more reason to share your bounty with others. Nothing says "I am thinking of you" like some homemade goodies (and for non-bakers, don't feel the need to explain if it wasn't technically *your* home). This is especially true for those who might still be isolating due to Covid concerns. Whether cards, calls, or cookies, this is the time of year to share a little love.

The gatherings of family and friends, whether inperson or some digital alternative, also offer a time to share some love and fellowship. But even if your family is one that fully lives into that stereotype of bickering around the table, I don't think that is necessarily bad either. Here again, as long as it doesn't go *too* far, in a world where we are growing increasingly polarized, the fact that we are willing to sit down and have conversations with people with whom we might disagree can be a small victory.

But please know your limits. It is okay to call a time-out in heated conversations and it is okay to give yourself permission to hit the pause on a particular tradition that is stressing you out. Still, being willing to tolerate a little chaos and stress in service of one another is a good and holy thing.

So be mindful of that balance this coming month – love yourself (by caring for your own mental and physical health) and love others too. And remember that through it all, through the joys, through the stresses, and, perhaps, the moments of grief that can accompany the holidays, that Jesus Christ, Emmanuel, God-with-us, is with us still.

What is an RMD?

Once you hit age 70½, the IRS requires you to start withdrawing from—and paying taxes on—most types of tax-advantaged retirement accounts, this is know as "Required Minimum Distribution". You will also need to take RMDs from any retirement accounts you inherit. In most cases, RMDs are treated as ordinary income for tax purposes.

Can I donate my RMD to charity and avoid the taxes?

YES. These "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCDs) will not be added to your taxable income for the year. A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA, payable directly to a qualified charity, as described in the QCD provision in the Internal Revenue Code. Amounts distributed as a QCD can be counted toward satisfying your RMD for the year, up to \$100,000. The QCD is excluded from your taxable income. This is not the case with a regular withdrawal from an IRA, even if you use the money to make a charitable contribution later. If you take a withdrawal, the funds would be counted as taxable income even if you later offset that income with the charitable contribution deduction.

Making a QCD as opposed to a normal charitable gift has two main advantages. First, a QCD counts toward satisfying the individual's required minimum distribution for that year. Second, the distribution is excluded from the taxpayer's income. (Information taken from the website:

Is Bethesda Lutheran Church a QCD?

YES! A charity must be a 501(c)(3) organization in order to receive tax-free IRA charitable contributions. Bethesda is a 501(c)(3) organization.

If you are 72, own an IRA, and donate to charity, QCDs may make sense for you; as always, consult your tax advisor or accountant to see if this is to your advantage.



BLUE CHRISTMAS SERVICE

Blue Christmas (also called the Longest Night) in the Western Christian tradition, is a day in the Advent season marking the longest night of the year. On this day, some churches hold a church service that recognizes the loss and loneliness that can be felt during the holidays due to death, disease, poverty, or abuse. It is a service that specifically enables individuals to experience their grief, as well as express what they are feeling, so they can find a sense of calm and hope.

Bethesda will be holding a Blue Christmas service on Tuesday, December 21st at 4:00pm. All are welcome.



Advent Colors

One of the season's symbolic colors is blue, representing hope. During Advent, we wait in hope to celebrate again God's coming in human form, and we look forward in hope to Christ's coming in glory at the end of the age. Purple symbolizes the royalty

of Jesus, the coming Prince of Peace, and the penitence with which we receive him. Some congregations also use pink or white candles in Advent wreaths, with pink symbolizing joy and white symbolizing the Christ child.
