#### **Parish Nurse Notes**

February is National Heart Month and a time to focus on heart health. High blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, obesity and smoking cigarettes are all factors that can increase the risk of heart disease. Steps that can be taken to lower the risk are controlling blood pressure, eating healthy and getting more exercise.

Another important part of this month is learning how to use an AED (automated external defibrillator) and how to perform CPR. An AED is a medical device that can analyze the heart rhythm and deliver an electric shock to victims of ventricular fibrillation to restore the heart rhythm to normal.

Did you know there is an AED at Bethesda? Do you know where it is and how to use it? During February there will be short training sessions offered to the various groups that meet at church and during a coffee fellowship.

Go to YouTube "New Hands-Only CPR Instructional Video" to learn how to perform lay person CPR.

#### **From the Pastor**

Blessings to you this February! As you can see elsewhere in this newsletter, our church has dedicated 2023 as a Year of Service! Each month we will lift up various organizations and service projects in

our community and encourage both financial support and hands on involvement.

For January, a group of Bethesda folks helped serve a community meal at First Lutheran in Aitkin. You can see some photos in these pages, and I have heard so many positive comments, so hopefully this will be something we will participate in again!

For February, the focus is on Hope Lodge, which offers a free place to stay for those battling cancer and who may have to travel long distances to receive treatment. This is such vital support for rural communities and families that are not only facing a difficult diagnosis but also difficult financial challenges.

For March, I was asked to highlight an organization that concerns our Native American brothers and sisters, and I managed to narrow it down to two. The first is the **Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center** in South Dakota (<a href="www.pineridgereconciliationcenter.org">www.pineridgereconciliationcenter.org</a>), the ministry where I spent my internship year in seminary. During my sabbatical, I was able to reconnect a bit with the Center and its current director, Pastor Dan Johnson. The Reconciliation Center continues to do an incredible amount of work on the Pine Ridge Reservation in SW South Dakota, home of the Oglala Lakota Sioux people. Their mission statement - "Fostering mutual trust, respect and understanding while addressing the deep poverty that exists on the reservation" – reflects the dual nature of their ministry.

On one hand, they are deeply embedded in the life of the community. They work to address homelessness and hunger. They run the Lutheran/Lakota Job Corps to help provide job training and employment experience. They lead a youth ministry for kids and teens, serve as a hub for distributing other donations of food, blankets, and diapers, to just name a few.

The other half of their work is their group ministry. From their website: "As a group, you will be invited into a cross cultural immersion that includes programming and presentations that strive to provide space for mutual conversations and greater understanding of each other." As someone who spent a year involved in this ministry, I am a big advocate for this kind of group experience.

Many mission trip types of experiences focus on work projects. You come, build something, and go home. You may meet some locals here and there, but often your group mostly just stays with your own group. But at the Reconciliation Center, groups spend time getting to know the place, the history, and the culture. Groups get to meet and learn from a variety of people from Pine Ridge. While building something physical can be an important part of our mission as Christians, building understanding and relationships is just as important. So, in addition to asking for your support in March, I would also love to see if there is interest in forming a group of our own for a trip out to Pine Ridge. Please let me know if you are interested!

The other organization I would like to highlight is the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition (www.boardingschoolhealing.org) or "NABS" for short. They are based out of Minneapolis, and, though it is a fully independent, native-led organization, it does have ties to the Lutheran Church. Vance Blackfox, the ELCA's Director for Indigenous Ministries & Tribal Relations, is a former NABS board member, as well as the late Rev. Marlene Helgemo, the first Native American woman ordained in the Lutheran Church.

As they share on their website: "NABS was created to develop and implement a national strategy that increases public awareness and cultivates healing for the profound trauma experienced by individuals, families, communities, American Indian and Alaska Native Nations resulting from the U.S. adoption and implementation of the Boarding School Policy of 1869."

The boarding school era is one of the most painful chapters in our country's history, but, for many years, was known by few outside of native communities. It is also one that has ramifications into the present day. There is a growing field of study around the way that stress and trauma can affect people on a genetic level, and impact health over generations.

NABS works both to help support healing among native people, but also to help educate and build understanding among people in general. We may not always like to talk about these painful parts of our history, but true healing can't happen without it. In next month's newsletter, I will provide additional updates on both organizations, ways to support them, and any upcoming educational or service opportunities. But for now, many thanks to all of you for your support thus far in our 2023 Year of Service!

The meeting was called to order by council president Dennis Hennessy. Pastor James gave the opening prayer.

#### Secretary's Report:

Motion was made to accept the minutes of the December meeting by Dick Stebbins and seconded by Mary Braun and passed.

#### **Treasurer's Report:**

Financial view and current month activity for December was presented by Mary Braun. She reported that we should be proud of our congregation for all the donations towards benevolences which was over \$22,000. Motion was made by Darlene Christensen to accept the treasurer's report, seconded Donna Ansell by and passed.

#### **Pastor's Report:**

Some items of note for this month's meeting:

- Thanks to the winter weather, taking a few sick days, and the post-Christmas crash, it has been a bit of a chaotic month, but there has still been plenty of activity at Bethesda this past month.
  - Christmas services went well, but the weather seems to have kept a number of folks home (or families from coming up to visit).

- 2023 will pose another tricky schedule with Christmas Eve falling on a Sunday.
- Hosted our first movie day of the winter, went well, though only a handful of people showed up. But no worry about our game day conflicting with a Vikings game.
- Planning for a baptism next week. Wilder Rono, son of Melanie White and Devin Rono. Sherri mentioned that her grandson has another child they would like to have baptized soon too.
- Met with the Mutual Ministry Committee again. Would like to meet with Personnel committee again in the near future to discuss goals, which would then be brought to council.
- My Friday morning class (every other week) out of United Seminary is going well. Need to start planning a project that would combine community outreach and service with an emphasis on helping communities navigate difficult conversations.
- For long term reflection: the synod has been noting more and more the pastor shortage, and the need to think creatively about how pastoral needs are met across our area.
- Approximately 5 in-person pastoral visits and 10 calls. Darlene and all our visitation & phone-calling folks continue to be a great support to our pastoral visitation ministry.

Strategic Planning Dean Malotky

- New Water Softener Request Property Committee recommended we replace the softener as soon as possible with a system supplied by Aquarius Home Services located in Baxter MN. This system uses no electricity, generates soft water only when needed, uses one-third the amount of salt as our current system, has a changeable filter and is warranted for ten years. The expected life span of this system is thirty years. The cost of this unit installed is \$6899 and could be totally paid for from the Property Accrual Fund. Also noted was that WELCA has donated \$500 towards the softener. A motion to accept the purchase of a new water softener by the Property Committee was made by Dick Stebbins, seconded by Mary Braun and passed.
- Ushers Gary Sjerven reported that he has made a list for ushers and greeters. It was also suggested that an usher ask (from a list of communion assistants) prior to the beginning of the service. Otherwise, Pastor will ask someone.
- Thank you to Dennis Hennessy for his two years as council president. And thank you to other council members for their service.

- Lent Pastor plans to do the Lent rotation with other pastors.
- Remember Project will be at Bethesda on April 20th (1 pm) and June 29th (10 am).
   There will be a Zoom Play on Alzheimer's.
- Lock Box was frozen a few times lately.
   Suggest property committee look at other options.

#### The Loan Closet



#### St. Valentine's sacrifice

Every February 14, we celebrate the loved ones in our lives with cards, flowers and chocolate. But Valentine's Day has another meaning that's been lost.

First declared a holiday by King Henry VIII of England in 1537, it commemorates the beheading of St. Valentine on February 14, 270 A.D. His crime? Performing wedding ceremonies after Roman Emperor Claudius II had outlawed marriage.

Valentine was martyred for faithfully doing the work God had given him. Although it's good to celebrate love and marriage, let's also remember the courage of a man who gave his life following his convictions.



"I love to help the people who need it most. ... Seeing people who are needy motivates me to help."

Amazingly, these aren't the words of a wealthy or comfortable person but of a teenager who, herself, is among the world's poorest. Her family lives in a Chilean slum and is assisted by a Christian human-services agency.

When fire broke out near the 16-year-old's home, leaving 220 already-destitute families homeless, the girl and her mother donated their own blankets, towels and other supplies to people who'd lost the little they had. Her mother even gave away clothes she'd planned to sell for much-needed household income.

I was humbled to read of this girl and her mom. So often I "have contributed out of [my] abundance"; but this pair, "out of [their] poverty ... put in ... all [they] had to live on" (Mark 12:44, NRSV).

Churches and other places of worship are designed to accommodate a large number of individuals. But big indoor spaces mean high power requirements for lighting, heating, and cooling — and high power bills.


In today's age of decreased giving, religious institutions are seeking to reduce their operating expenses without cutting services to their congregation and community.

Unfortunately for churches (synagogues, mosques, and temples, too), saving money on electricity can be tough. And the larger the building, the harder it is to cut back on electricity costs.

Turning off the lights and unplugging equipment between services can help, but only to an extent. The good news is that the large size of church buildings and other houses of worship actually presents a shining opportunity: lots of space for solar panels!

Both food insecurity and hunger disproportionately affect the young and the old and have far-

reaching negative effects on physical and mental health.

According to the Minnesota Department of Health, **Minnesota ranks 7th worst in the nation** for the share of residents with access to healthy foods.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that pediatricians **screen all children for food insecurity** because of the inherent short and long-term adverse health impacts associated with it.

**BEFORE COVID-19**: The United States Department of Agriculture found that 15.0 million U.S. households were food insecure at some time during 2017; and Feeding America reported that 1 out of 11 Minnesota households were affected by hunger, Minnesotans miss 100 million meals each year because of need even when food banks are considered, and Minnesota's child food insecurity rate was 13.8%.

**POST COVID-19 OUTBREAK:** A study released May 2020 by the Brookings Institution found **a doubling of household food insecurity rates** following the COVID19
