



Creation of light and darkness, sun, moon, and stars


1:1 In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.

^{1:2} Now the earth was without shape and empty, and darkness was over the surface of the watery deep, but the Spirit of God was moving over the surface of the water. ^{1:3} God said, "Let there be light." And there was light! ^{1:4} God saw that the light was good, so God separated the light from the darkness. ^{1:5} God called the light "day" and the darkness "night." were quite old.


^{8–12} It so happened that as Zachariah was carrying out his priestly duties before God, working the shift assigned to his regiment, it came his one turn in life to enter the sanctuary of God and burn incense. The congregation was gathered and praying outside the Temple at the hour of the incense offering. Unannounced, an angel of God appeared just to the right of the altar of incense. Zachariah was paralyzed in fear.

But the angel reassured him, "Don't fear, Zachariah. Your prayer has been heard. Elizabeth, your wife, will bear a son by you. You are to name

him John. You're going to leap like a gazelle for joy, and not only you—many will delight in his birth. He'll achieve great stature with God.

"He'll drink neither wine nor beer. He'll be filled with the Holy Spirit from the moment he leaves his mother's womb. He will turn many sons and daughters of Israel back to their God. He will herald God's arrival in the style and strength of Elijah, soften the hearts of parents to children, and kindle devout understanding among hardened skeptics—he'll get the people ready for God."

SIXTH READING: Luke 2:22-40

The Prophecies of Simeon & Anna

²² When the time came for the purification rites required by the Law of Moses, Joseph and Mary took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord"), ²⁴ and to offer a sacrifice in keeping with what is said in the Law of the Lord: "a pair of doves or two young pigeons."

²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷ Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:

²⁹ "Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace.

³⁰ For my eyes have seen your salvation,

³¹ which you have prepared in the sight of all nations:

³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel."

³³ The child's father and mother marveled at what was said about him.


³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: "This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign

that will be spoken against, ³⁵ so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too."

³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna, the daughter of Penuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was very old; she had lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ and then was a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped night and day, fasting and praying. ³⁸ Coming up to them at that very moment, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem.

³⁹ When Joseph and Mary had done everything required by the Law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ And the child grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was on him.

BISHOP'S CHRISTMAS GREETING

I told the synod staff last week that I'm having a hard time finding the "Merry" in Christmas or the "Joy" in Joy to the World this season. The emotional weight of the war in Palestine, especially Gaza, is difficult. The January trip planned by the ELCA with four synods traveling together to visit our companions in India has been postponed because of safety concerns for Christians in an unstable political environment. There seems to be more anger and lashing out between people and in public forums. From hurting bodies and souls to hurting relationships and communities, it's clear that things are not as they should be. Some of us live with varying degrees of physical pain or a new diagnosis, and others of us harbor the emotional pain of loneliness, shame, and guilt. Looking at our culture more broadly, we see the harm of our social divisions and the unyielding reality and impact of injustice and inequity.

For me, this Christmas, plain and simple, seems *hard*. And yet, I know that it is exactly into this same difficult, divisive, uncertain, unfriendly, and politically unstable world that God became incarnate in human form as a baby – the Christ child. A friend reminded me of a poem that was written by the French writer, Madeleine L'Engle.

"Into the Darkest Hour"

It was a time like this,
war & tumult of war,
a horror in the air.
Hungry yawned the abyss —
and yet there came the star
and the child most wonderfully there.
It was a time like this
of fear & lust for power,
license & greed and blight —
and yet the Prince of bliss came into the darkest hour
in quiet & silent light.
And in a time like this

how celebrate his birth when all things fall apart?
Ah! Wonderful it is with no room on the earth the stable is our heart.

The stable is our heart. What a good reminder of Immanuel – God with us. Not just coming close, but with us, in us, in our very hearts. Ah – just what I need to hear over and over again, especially this year. In the midst of what can sometimes feel like a heavy and challenging world, it is reassuring to be reminded of the promise of hope and renewal that God gifts the world in Christ Jesus.



During this season, I have also thought about the Japanese artform of kintsugi – meaning "to join with gold". Taking pieces of shattered pottery and adorning the broken ceramics with a lacquer mixed with powdered gold is part of a more than 500-year-old Japanese tradition. Broken pottery is melded

back together with gold to symbolize the beauty in brokenness. When things fall apart – they can be made new as the flaws and missteps are reshaped – not erased. This not only teaches calm when a cherished piece of pottery breaks; it is a reminder of the beauty of human fragility as well. Learning to accept and celebrate scars and flaws is a powerful lesson in humanity and sustainability. A good lesson when the world around us seems so broken.

This year, more than ever, I am grateful for the light that Christ brings into our lives, which is like the golden glue of shattered pottery – offering the promise of being made new despite all the turmoil and tumult around us. As you gather with loved ones this Christmas and cherish the warmth of togetherness, I pray that you also embrace the hope, the promise, and the renewal of God coming to us in the person of Jesus – where the stable is the heart. This action is to let us know that

we are loved and cared for and healed and saved and invited to participate in all the goodness and beauty and grace and joy and love and peace of who God is. Forever.

Wishing you and your loved ones a Christmas filled with love, the light of hope, and the joy that comes from knowing that we are surrounded by the grace of God.


