From the Pastor

Christ is risen, alleluia! He is risen indeed, alleluia!

Easter blessings to all of you! Whether you were able to worship with us in Malmo or spent the day

elsewhere, I hope you had a wonderful day!

This year Easter falls on the day before April Fools' Day – a confluence of holidays that happens every so often. Given Easter's status as the most important of all Christian holidays, perhaps this quirk of the calendar seems a bit... sacrilegious? How can a holiday based around jokes and pranks ever compare with Jesus' death and resurrection and the salvation of the world?

Yet Easter is first and foremost a joyous occasion! Both Easter day and the season that follows highlights God's great act of love given to us in Jesus' life, death, and resurrection and how that love changes the world. How could we do anything but smile on such a day?

But I think the connections might run even deeper. Our faith is meant to be transformative, and humor can be a useful tool in inspiring change. Humor, at its best, tells a truth. More than just a vehicle for insults and innuendo, humor has the ability to reveal something about what it means to be a human being.

Even if we think back on the humor of our childhood, that brand of humor that is so often focused on bodily functions of one kind or another, even that kind of humor tells a truth. For a kid, as much as the enjoyment of that humor comes from watching our parents squirm, it also provides some comfort, some measure of catharsis.

Our bodies, young or old, can be incredibly stressinducing. Humor found in burps and farts helps kids bring that stress to light and helps them to realize that they are not alone in their fears. We all deal with these "gross" and embarrassing realities, even though most adults learn to keep it to themselves as much as possible in polite company.

More adult kinds of humor work similarly – whether the joke concerns relationships or politics or matters of life and death, humor helps us see reality more clearly. It can poke fun at our fears, it can mock the powerful

and those who might be a source of our stress, but it also connects us to other people. Humor fights that tendency to hide our fears and put on a brave face. Humor deflates our ego and keeps us from pretending that we aren't the same flesh and blood as everyone else.

Certainly, when humor is misused, it can be hypocritical and cruel, but the best humor delights in bringing our shortcomings into the light of day. Not to hurt us, but to remind us that we all have our struggles. When we are honest about that, there can be a great comfort in learning that we are not alone in even our most embarrassing and creative screw-ups.

The Easter story easily could have been an embarrassing story for Jesus' followers. Their leader had been executed in a particularly violent and public fashion. Moreover, they had not even shown themselves in a particularly heroic light. One of Jesus' closest disciples, Peter, had even denied knowing him to save his own skin. And yet, that wasn't the end.

Communities of faith, at our best, are places of truth telling. The disciples didn't hide from the truth, even if that meant revealing their own weaknesses. In our churches, we come to learn about ourselves and our place in God's world. To strengthen our relationship with God and our neighbor. And that requires honesty, even about our fears and our failures. The Christian life should more about laughing at ourselves than pretending we are perfect.

We tell truth about the unpleasant so that it no longer has a hold over us. Confess it before God and neighbor so that the fears, the nervousness, and our own guilt and shame no longer controls us. That is the essence of Jesus' Easter gift of salvation – so we should live into it!

Don't be afraid to enjoy both Easter and April Fools. As the Psalmist sings: "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth." The psalmist may have had singing and horns and lyres and clapping hands in mind, but probably wouldn't begrudge a good, hearty laugh too.


Soup and Cookie Ministry
